HURON PRESBYTERIAL

The semi-annual conference of the Huron Presbyterian Woman's Missionary Society was held in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Bayfield, on Tuesday, September 14, there being a larger attendance at the forenoon meeting than in any previous year.

The morning session, which commenced at 10 a.m., was conducted by the Brucefield Auxiliary, Mrs. W. McQueen presiding. Mrs. D. McIntosh gave a helpful Bible reading, which was followed by the reading of the minutes by the secretary, Miss H. L. Graham.

Reports given, and suggestive remarks by the treasurer, Mrs. J. C. Craig of Seaford.

Reports given.

Interesting reports of the provincial meeting in Stratford, and the general council meeting in Calgary, were given by Mrs. C. Monteith of Kippin, and Mrs. J. R. Macdonald of Stratford, after which some time was spent in business and discussion. The honorary president, Mrs. F. H. Larkin of Seaford, presented a summary of the reports of the presbytery delegates appointed to visit the various auxiliaries.

300 Delegates.

Over 300 delegates, including members of the presbytery, sat down to a sumptuous repast prepared by the Bayfield women, for whose hospitable entertainment a vote of thanks was conveyed by Rev. Colin Fisher, D.D., father of the presbytery. The devotional exercises in the afternoon were led by Clinton Auxiliary, Mrs. J. E. Hogg presiding, the Scriptures reading being taken from W. Gunn. The pastor, Rev. A. McFarlane, in a suitable address, conveyed the greetings of the Huron Presbytery.

Address on Missions.

Mrs. Harkness of Wroxeter, who was one of the pioneer missionaries in Korea, delivered an earnest and inspiring address.

A pleasant feature of the program was the presentation of a life membership certificate to the Bayfield Auxiliary, by the members, and an "In Memoriam" certificate from the Huron Presbytery to the presbytery president, Mrs. Jas. Hamilton, Goderich, in memory of her sister, the late Dr. Marion Oliver Young Women's Auxiliary of Byth.

\$10,000 Objective.

Last year the Huron Presbytery contributed \$6,700, which was the second highest contribution in the province. This year their objective is \$10,000. A pageant on India, given by members of the McGillivray Mission Band, Goderich, was much appreciated, and a solo was also rendered by F. Saunders of Goderich. A resolution expressing regret at the removal to another sphere of service of Mrs. W. E. M. Aitken of Brucefield. Three-minute echoes from the mission bands were very bright and interesting. Prayers were offered by Mrs. S. Carriere, Grand Bend; Mrs. W. Scott, Clinton; Mrs. Blyth; Mrs. James Moore, Kippin; and Miss Jekyl, Exeter. The next conference will be held at Goderich.

CRIMEA NUCLEUS OF GOVERNMENT AGAINST REDS

Watchful Waiting Is Policy of Wrangel.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—More complete information than has heretofore reached the United States concerning the policy of Gen. Wrangel, anti-Bolshevik leader in South Russia, has been received here in an authoritative quarter.

It has been known for some time that Gen. Wrangel, unlike his predecessor, Gen. Denikin, and Admiral Kolchak, does not contemplate any extensive military offensive against the Moscow government, but, on the contrary, intends to hold his ground in the Crimea and adjacent territories as an anti-Bolshevik nucleus, pending further development of the situation within Soviet Russia.

Sees Weakening of Control.

According to the present information, Gen. Wrangel anticipates that the eventual slackening of the Bolshevik authority will be accomplished by a shortening of the radius of the control exercised by Moscow. This shortening of the radius of control will result in districts of territory, from which the Bolsheviks have been driven, dropping off from the soviet structure.

Were there no other government functioning in Russia than that of the Bolsheviks, according to Wrangel's views, these territories dropped from Soviet Russia would fall into a state of anarchy. If, on the other hand, the anti-Bolshevik elements can maintain a liberal democratic government in South Russia in whose administration the masses of the people are content, there will be a nucleus which can gather in the districts from which the soviet control has passed, and supply to them an administrative organization which already is successfully in operation.

Mistake of Former Leaders.

Denikin and Kolchak both are believed by Wrangel, it is stated, to have made the mistake of concentrating their entire effort to gain military success while neglecting the administrative organization of their territories. Wrangel, it is affirmed, is therefore following a policy of giving its first attention to the establishment of a government which will bring contentment and satisfaction to the people under its authority, using his military forces only for the maintenance of his position. In this way, through agrarian reforms and other measures designed to meet the needs and desires of the people, Gen. Wrangel, it is said, is seeking to attain a degree of stability and order to be welcomed by other parts of Russian

territory which, eventually released from soviet rule, would otherwise be left in a chaotic state.

Caring for Refugees.

One of the reasons also given for this move was the necessity of feeding and caring for the thousands of refugees concentrated in the Crimea. These refugees, it was held, were for the most part men and women of the intellectual classes, whose preservation was a necessity for the good of the future Russian nation.

Also it was said to be one of the chief efforts of Gen. Wrangel to avoid the influence of an entourage of military reactionists. While both Denikin and Kolchak are said to have been men of liberal and democratic ideals, the nature of their respective regimes led to an arbitrary influence on the part of purely military circles, in which in all nations there exists a strong tendency toward military autocracy. It is asserted that in this possibility lies the greatest danger of the Wrangel government, and that every precaution is being taken against it.

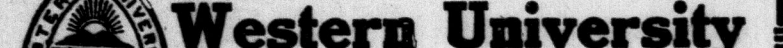
