Ontario Govt. Will Pay Third of Idle Relief

Raney Announces That Province Will Assume Share of Burden.

Toronto, Dec. 20.—One-third of the amount spent by the municipalities of the province of Ontario on emergency relief this winter will be contributed by the Ontario Government, provided the other two-thirds is paid either by the municipalities or the municipalities and Dominion Government jointly, according to an announcement jointly, according to an announcement made here tonight by Attorney-General Raney. The attorney-general stated that before the Ontario Government handed over any money in this way it would have to be informed as to the general system and details of the relief given, and the safeguards adopted to prevent abuses creeping into the distribution, which must be approved of by the Provincial Government.

Fire Chief Keyes, in his annual report, showed that the city's fire loss this year was \$12,000. There were 27 alarms during the year. The chief recommended the purchase of a motor hose truck. Building permits for the year totaled 102, value \$221,760.

His worship, in replying, expressed his thanks and appreciation of the co-operation shown him by the members of the council and officials. BRANTFORD VETERANS WANT WORK, NOT RELIEF

City Has Overdraft of \$19,000 on the Year's Work.

Brantford, Dec. 21.—Representatives of 200 unemployed veterans appeared before the city council this evening and appealed for immediate action to give the veterans work. Eight per cent of these were able-bodied, willing to tackle any kind of work, and do not want relief. Sewer construction, which will keep 50 men busy, was at once ordered, and new work will be laid out at the earliest possible date. To cope with the general unemployment situation the aid of the Dominion and province will be secured. Outsiders will be advised not to come to Brantford for work or relief.

City Treasurer A. K. Bunnell reported that the civic overdraft of \$32,000 caused by pending boards would be reduced to \$19,000, as the city council had kept its expenditure below the estimates.


