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# HOLESAKE FRUITS AND VEGETABLES

Deliveries of all kinds of domestic fruits were fairly liberal yesterday, are in fact, every day, but the demand seemed to be active and prices steady.

Peaches generally were selling from 35c to 50c for six-quart baskets, and 50c to \$1 for 11-quart baskets; pears sold at 40c to 50c for 11-quart baskets; plums 20c to 35c for 6-quart baskets; grapes 50c to 65c for sixes; tomatoes, 30c to 35c per 11-quart, and so on.

The wholesale fruit market is one of the busiest places in the whole city and an object lesson in respect to the tremendous development of the fruit trade of Ontario, especially the Niagara district. The order and system everywhere apparent and the attractive way in which the produce is displayed, reflect the fact that the stock undoubtedly has a stimulating effect upon trade.

In this connection a number of the firms yesterday said that the present was a splendid time for the women of the city to lay in their supplies; never better. There is little or no likelihood of lower prices this season. The general quality of the fruit coming in is excellent and the prices reasonable.
