

the end of the year to the circumstance that there are not a few in all parts of our city, who are living in the neglect of the public means of grace. It would be glad to see some steps taken towards the systematic visitation of even a small district contiguous to our own Church, such as, under the blessing of God, might bring some of these to the sanctuary.

In closing, the Session may be permitted to say that it has learned, with much gratification, the fact that the contributions to the Missionary and Educational Schemes of the General Assembly have been so well sustained, notwithstanding the special efforts put forth to reduce the debt of the Church and to endow Knox College.

Another year has drawn to a close, and your Managers have much pleasure in presenting their Twenty-ninth Annual Report.

The Treasurer's Statement will, they think, be received with a great deal of satisfaction, as the receipts shew an increase under every head.

The total receipts for the year amount to \$11,568.90; the disbursements, to \$11,276.89; and the balance on hand, December 31st, \$802.48; shewing an increase of \$292.01 over the balance carried over last year.
