## SEVERAL OFFICERS

HOME FROM WAR

Report Regarding Lieut. C. Fairweather of 26th

LIEUT. CARTER RETURNS

Striking Speeches at Imperial Meeting Last Evening—"Canada Should Raise 750,000 Men"

It is unofficially reported in London that Lieut. Fairweather, 26th Battalion, is to be awarded the Victoria Cross for his bravery at the front, according to Lieut. A. Desbrisay Carter, the first wounded officer of the battalion to return home. He is on leave until the middle of next month. Lieut. Carter was wounded on October 18, and has the piece of shrapnel which pierced his thigh as a souvenir. He is being warmly welcomed by old friends. Lieut. Carter speaks with pride of the great work of the 26th Battalion and says they will deserve the name the "fighting 26th". Several others returned on the *Mississauga* yesterday with Lieutenant Carter. Among them were three chaplains, who are returning to Canada. They have completed their term and are resigning to continue their work at home. They were Major T. J. Thompson, of Ottawa, who was at Cairo for a long period; Captain A. B. Payne, of Moosejaw, and Dr. R. B. Taylor, of the 42nd Highlanders, Montreal. Other officers were Captain McCausland, of Regina, whose eyesight was impaired by a bursting bomb; Captain R. Girouard, of Perth (Ont.), who went away with the 22nd battalion, and Lieutenant Smith, of the field artillery, Montreal. Captain Girouard was blown into the air twice by exploding mines, from which a physical breakdown resulted. The other officer was shot twice in the arm. All, excepting the chaplains, are home on leave. One wounded soldier also returned. He was private Hickey, of Newfoundland. His injuries were not serious, but he was allowed the privilege of spending Christmas at home on furlough. He went across with the first Canadian contingent. Five hundred Newfoundlanders comprised the unit. From England they went direct to the Dardanelles, where they have been fighting for months. He was wounded about three weeks ago, and after spending four weeks in hospital in England, returned home.

Casualties

Fred Grant, Sydney, N. S., and Hugh A. McPherson, Sydney Mines, N. S., reported wounded with the 25th Battalion; Myles Sullivan, Moncton, N. B., and Walter F. Sterling, St. John, N. B., 26th Battalion are reported wounded, and also Albert McLake, Chatham, N. B., 1st Battalion.

Pte. Jacques Ozone, found murdered at Gravesend, England, as reported in Saturday's Times, was in St. John about three days ago, as a member of the 9th C. M. Rifles.

At the Imperial

An unusually well attended meeting was held last evening in the Imperial Theatre, addressed by the Lordship Bishop Richardson, Mayor Bruce Taylor, and others. The meeting was held in connection with the Imperial Christmas bazaar, and was given by the Imperial Theatre and vocal numbers by C. A. Munro. The speeches were followed with keen attention. Enthusiasm was aroused to a high pitch by Mayor Taylor's statement that while at the front he had seen the 26th and it was in his opinion the best battalion in the front today. Bishop Richardson spoke on the causes of the war, its start and end, and placed the entire blame upon the militarist ideals of the Kaiser. In proportion Canada should raise 750,000 men, the bishop said. Major Fitchcombe agreed in this and said that the one reason dominions must increase their quota.

M. E. Agar presided at Saturday night's meeting at the Mill street recruiting office and the chief speaker was H. A. Powell, K. C., who gave a gripping speech. Mr. Crowwell, R. Holder and H. McKinnon took part in the programme. Two recruits, Berton A. Ramsay and H. L. Bourne of St. John were signed.
