MALONEY VICTOR IN FIERCE FIGHT

Weigand, De Kuh and Seifert Win Elimination Contests

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—Jimmy Maloney, new Boston strong boy, battered Franz Diener, of Germany, to defeat in a fierce ten-round final bout of Tex Rickard's heavyweight elimination tournament tonight. Diener was battered continually under a hail of smashing punches, but managed to keep his feet throughout. Maloney weighed 201; Diener 186.

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—Art Weigand, Buffalo southpaw, scored a one-round knockout over Al Rood, New York brawler, in the first of four ten-round contests in Tex Rickard's heavyweight elimination tournament tonight. A flock of crashing left hooks to the head felled Rood for the long count after 2 minutes and 42 seconds of fighting. Weigand weighed 176½; Rood, 181.

Art De Kuh, New York Italian, won from Charley Anderson, Chicago negro, in the third round of the second ten-round match when the mid-west slugger dislocated his left shoulder after 36 seconds of fighting in the round. The weights were: De Kuh, 206; Anderson, 192.

Sandy Seifert, of Pittsburgh, won the decision over Jack De Mave, "Golden Boy" of Hoboken, N. J., in a ten-round semi-final battle of blonds. The constant clinching and infighting met with complete disapproval from the gallery. Seifert weighed 182½; De Mave, 188.

Want To Pay Share of Judge Landis' Salary

ASHVILLE, N. C., Dec. 3.—Minor league baseball, having taken up a large part of Judge K. M. Landis' time since he was appointed to supervise baseball in 1919, now wants to pay part of his salary.

The twenty-fifth annual meeting of the National Association of Professional Baseball Clubs, which convenes

here next week, will find the minor league offer before it, as soon as it meets. Heretofore, the majors have paid all of the judge's salary, although the minors have called upon him to untangle difficulties on numerous occasions.
