NOW THREE CANDIDATES

The entry of Dr. White into the field makes it a three cornered contest to date. The nomination papers of A. M. Rowan were filed some days ago and the nomination papers of Dr. J. H. Barton were filed this morning with the common council.

Those in the field for the two commissions are the present commissioners, R. W. Wignmore and R. H. Bullock, John B. Jones, Alexander Corbet, George Carvill and R. J. Legan.

DR. BARTON'S PLATFORM

During the last few weeks there has been considerable comment over the lack of definite statements of policy by the majority candidates. Yesterday in the course of an interview with a representative of the Times-Star, Dr. J. H. Barton set forth the main planks in his platform as follows:

1. Law and order. Enforcement of all laws.
2. Continuation of the tax exemption on repairs and improvements to buildings.
3. Economy in all departments until the existing business depression clears up.
4. Study of taxation reduction and collection problems.
5. Sympathetic co-operation with the merchants and manufacturers so that they may give employment to our people. Appointment of a committee to go after new industries, telling the world of our advantages as an export city.
6. Co-operation with the Board of Trade or any other body of citizens who will work for the development of our port and the trade of our port.
7. Continued presentation of our problems before the governments at Ottawa and Fredericton.
8. Encouragement of tourist travel.

BUSY IN MARKET.

A profusion of flowers beautified the city market for the Easter Sunday morning with the florists doing a thriving trade in lilies, tulips, narcissus, daisies, roses and other kinds.
