General Board Wants This by Year 1925

New Ships Recommended For 1921 Maintenance of 'Powerful Navy Regarded as a Pre-ventive of War'

Washington, Dec. 10.—Recommendations of the navy general board for the building programme for 1921 include two battleships, one battle cruiser, ten scout cruisers, five destroyers, twelve leaders and six submarines. United States should ultimately be equal to the most powerful navy in the world, not later than 1925, the report adds.

The general board urged a policy of naval expansion that will guarantee the maintenance of such navy, by the United States would be a great preventive of war, for no other nation would lightly provoke hostilities when her own commerce would thereby be imperilled.

The necessary force strength of the American navy, therefore, must depend, the board says, upon naval strength of "the powers in a position to challenge our legitimate commercial expansion upon the high seas."

For development and construction of aircraft during the year, the board recommended an appropriation of \$37,000,000 with \$6,000,000 to be used for experimental construction.

GREAT EFFORT TOGETHER TO AVERT CRASH

Breakdown of Credit, Exchange, Commerce and Trade

London Authority, Sir George Paish, Appeals For American Financial and Commercial Co-operation

London, Dec. 10. (By The Associated Press).—Sir George Paish, editor of the London Statist and a well known financial authority, writes in the Globe appealing for American commercial and financial co-operation with Europe.

"It is becoming clearly evident," he says, "that unless the entire problem is soon dealt with in all its aspects a complete breakdown of credit, of exchange, of commerce and of trade must occur in the not distant future." The collective effort required to avert disaster, he asserts, is the greatest the world has ever been called upon to make.

"The people of Europe," he writes, "cannot support themselves without the continued grant of credit for the purchase of urgently needed food and raw materials."

Referring to Secretary of the Treasury's statement that the problem of financing the restoration of Europe belongs primarily to American exporters, the writer says that this is much too big for the American exporters to deal with; they cannot go beyond the limits of their own credit, which are already nearly reached.

He holds that the protective tariff is primarily responsible for Europe's inability to pay America for American goods. These laws, he wrote, are designed to keep out foreign goods, and by selling goods to America can only pay for American goods.

"Although the question of the American tariff and American policy is one for the American people alone," he concludes, "the claims of humanity demand that America in one way or another, by banking credit, by private loans, by government loans, should supply Europe with the food and material she needs in this great emergency."

The Globe says the question will be raised in the House of Commons, where the United States has not been asked to pay in payment for Great Britain's debt an equivalent amount of securities of the United States.

"This plan," says the Globe, "would materially rectify the adverse exchange of the United States credit and reduce the cost of living."

"Not in this country, thank you!" was the reply. "My parents died when I was over so little and I went into service at 14. I have had enough of service here, and I'm off to the States as soon as I can get a passport."

"What will you do there?"

"Oh, go into service. Several girls have gone there, and prefer it ever so much to service here. They have good wages, and every evening and Sunday off. Of course, they work hard when they are in the house, but they get liberty. Another thing is that they can go back to their homes when they like. They have their own latchkey."


FEWER SWEETS NEXT YEAR.



The Germans, he says, are laying vast emphasis on education and have re-opened the University of Cologne, defunct since 1909 years, and are ordering chiefly to establish courses in commerce and industrial work.
