BULLET IN HEART, HE LIVED THIRTY YEARS

Swiss Gendarme Dies at Age of Sixty-Three; Cause, a Cold

Geneva, Nov. 5.—A Swiss gendarme, Gottfried Fischer, who had "worn" a bullet in his heart for the last thirty years, has just died at Zollikof, in the Canton of Argovie, at his home, at the age of sixty-three, of a cold on the lungs.

At the age of thirty-three, while pursuing a criminal, he received a bullet in the heart during the chase, and was taken to hospital in a serious condition. The doctors did not expect him to recover, but Fischer, to their astonishment, gradually became well and healthy to such a degree that he was able to join the gendarmes and carry out his ordinary duties for the next twenty-five years, still carrying the bullet in his heart, as no surgeon would undertake the dangerous operation of removing it.

During the last few years, however, the gendarme began losing weight and health, and he passed away unconscious, without pain, and still carrying the bullet in his heart.

FRAUD ON FELLOW PRISONER

Bertillon Identification System Brings To Light Strange Case

Paris, Nov. 5.—Through the Bertillon identification system a curious case of one man going to prison in the place of another has just come to light. Examining the records relating to one Brecher, who has just completed thirteen months' imprisonment, M. Bertillon was led to the discovery that the prisoner was not Brecher at all, but a man named Felde, who had been sentenced to only nine days' imprisonment.

Investigation showed that the two men had shared the same cell in the Sauto prison. There Brecher, a clever swindler, told Felde he was a rich man, "if," he said, "you will remain in jail instead of me, I will send you \$100 a month, so that when the thirteen months are over you will be quite a small capitalist, and no longer a vagabond."

Felde agreed, and when on the appointed day he heard the head warden enter the cell and say, "Felde, you are free; leave the prison," Felde remained motionless and Brecher walked out. Felde, in the name of Brecher, was transferred to the workhouse of France, where he served out the other man's sentence. It may be added that Felde never saw a farthing of the money.

GRANDMOTHER OF 270

This Woman Has Buried Six Husbands

Natal, Nov. 5.—Mrs. Thekla M. de Beer, widow, seventy-eight years of age, residing at Pretoria, probably holds the world's record in matrimonial ventures.

At the age of eighteen she married Petrus Jacobus Lubbe, who died, leaving her with one child. Ten months later she took another husband, a widower with three children. A year and five months afterwards he also died, leaving her with four children. Another eleven years she married for the third time, another widower, this time with seven children. With him she lived for eleven years, and had seven children, when he also died.

After five years' widowhood she married for the fourth time, on this occasion a widower with eight children. With him she had four children, and after eleven years, he too, died. Five years later she married a man named Hendrik Kloppe. Another eleven years elapsed and then her fifth husband died, leaving her with ten children.

In two years' time she contracted another marriage with Hendrik Van Wyk, a widower, who brought five children to swell the family. Another eleven years passed, and he, too, went the way of his predecessors, his death occurring only recently.

CENSOR FORBIDS PLAY

England is Now to Have Censorship of Moving Pictures

London, Nov. 5.—The examiner of plays, Charles H. E. Brookfield, has prohibited the city. All kinds of Chinese and American dishes. Dinner from 11:30 to 2. Fall meals 25c. New proprietor, Charlie Wei. 1173-11-6.

A large company was brought from Berlin with elaborate settings and was to have appeared in the Palace Theatre tonight. After witnessing the rehearsal, the censor forbade the production on the ground that the whole tone of the performance rendered it unsuitable for the English stage.

A censorship of moving pictures is about to be instituted. The former dramatic censor, George A. Bedford, has been appointed with ten assistants, to examine films at the request of English manufacturers who say that the nature of many foreign pictures has had an unfavorable effect on the moving picture business.

WAR EFFECT ON BRITISH TRADE

Lancashire Cotton Goods Export Most Likely to Be Hardest Hit

London, Nov. 5.—There is no industry in this country which is likely to be more seriously affected by the war in the near east than the cotton trade of Lancashire. The countries concerned are important outlets for manufactured cotton goods, and already merchants are meeting with a restricted trade. Fresh buying, of course, is practically at a standstill, and in some cases shippers are being compelled to stop further exports for the time being.

Last year Turkey took 480,000 yards of calico, made in Lancashire, and Roumania, and Greece 60,000,000 yards. Some manufacturers are now turning their looms on to cloths suitable for other markets, such as India. It is an easy matter to gauge the probable effects of the war upon trade, and some alarming reports as to machinery in Lancashire going on short time in a few weeks should not be taken seriously.

If the war continues the British export trade will be somewhat crippled, but some shipments will take place. What merchants fear more than anything else is that remittances will be interfered with, and in that case serious financial troubles may occur.

In consequence of the inflated freight rates due to the war, the banks' suspension of financial support to exporters, and the refusal of foreign importers to share the shippers' risks, the Black Sea grain trade has been completely paralyzed. British shipping is a heavy sufferer.

Another Comet
Cambridge, Mass., Nov. 5.—The discovery of a new comet by Astronomer Borrelly of Marseilles, France, is announced in a telegram received today by the Harvard College observatory from Professor Kobold of Kiel, Germany. The position of the comet is given on Nov. 2 as right ascension 17 hours 47 minutes; declination plus 28 degrees 57 minutes. The comet is reported to have been visible in a small telescope, and to be moving southeast.

METHODIST MINISTERS
The weekly meeting of the Methodist Ministers of the city, postponed from yesterday on account of the meeting of the Evangelical Alliance, was held this morning. The ministers decided to endeavor to arrange a public meeting to be addressed by Rev. A. H. Ranton of Toronto who is now conducting services in Amherst. The subject of the lecture would be "From Bar Room to Pulpit," and the organization of the various temperance organizations of the city will be sought.

A woman holds a closed umbrella by the middle, and usually clasps it to her body. No one ever saw a man carrying it in this way. A woman usually raises a cup or a glass or a fork to her lips correctly, that is, with her elbow close to her body.

Moosejaw, Sask., Nov. 5.—The Dominion land sale agency at Willow Bunch has been closed. This step was made necessary by railway construction and consequent change in the population centre. Amiskwia will probably be the new point chosen.

Regina, Sask., Nov. 5.—While no actual settlement of the strike of telephone linemen has been effected, the men will return to work pending, what it is believed, will prove to be an early settlement.
