With this advertisement, which he inserted in The New York Times, Mr. Carlson started out to find his wife, five grown, unmarried children, a married son with his wife and two children, all of whom disappeared from the Carlson home in Flatbush, Brooklyn. According to Mr. Carlson, all were at home when he returned from work

Wednesday. They pleaded with him to buy another house in Bay Ridge. He refused, saying that prices were too high this fall. He is positive that this was the only difference between them on Friday night. The next morning before Mr. Carlson awoke all ten had vanished.

And last only had they vanished out with them went a large part of the furniture and all the family pictures, even to the picture of Mrs. Carlson, taken for her passport for Sweden last spring. Here is Mr. Carlson's story:

"It all happened so suddenly that I hardly know just what to say. I have been employed in a big department store, in charge of all repairs, for more than twenty years.
