NORTH END GROUNDS

Game Will be Played Between Algonquins and Carleton

The first Rugby match of the season will be played this afternoon on the Shamrock grounds between the Algonquin seniors and a team representing Carleton. Owing to the uncertainty regarding the baseball match which may be played on the North End grounds this morning, it has not yet been decided who will referee the game, but it is likely that A. McCracken will be asked to officiate.

The Carleton team, according to the line-up announced is composed of men who played in the Intermediate League last season, together with some seniors. Wright and Ring, who were with the Algonquins last year, and Baker, who was with St. Peter's, are placed on the West Side XV. It is likely, however, that the Algonquin manager will protest against Baker.

On the Algonquin team will be seen some players who have figured in local football before and also some strangers. Tully, who has played several years with St. Francis Xavier College and also in Cape Breton, will be on the half line. Dr. Bonnell, formerly of St. John High School and Tufts College, will also be out. Stalling of last year's Acadia team is also announced as an Algonquin half-back, but it is doubtful if he will be able to play today. Harrington, Carten and Debery of last year's St. Peter's team are also given places with the Indians' team. The others were with the Algonquins last season.
