BOSTON COUNCIL IN FAVOR OF NEW CHARTER
BOSTON, Mass., Feb. 4.—The city council of Boston tonight went on record in favor of a referendum for the Boston Finance Commission's revised city charter, which was proposed by the commission in a report sent to the general court last week. The council also passed, over the mayor's veto, an order preventing him from retaining at the expense of the city, counsel to represent the mayor at the state house in the charter revision draft and his own bills.

THE LAW AGAINST JU-JU
The proclamation provides similar penalties for the making and using of ju-ju for illegal purposes and for the practice and encouragement of ju-ju worship, and any chief who countenances such trials by ordeal or prohibition of ju-ju worship is liable, on conviction, to a fine of \$1,000, or to imprisonment for three years.
