

## SOX MUST LOOK GOOD TO CALLAHAN WHEN COLLINS IS KEPT ON THE BENCH

The Chicago White Sox are playing ball with a team that looks so good to Manager Jim Callahan that he can afford to keep on the bench, Jack Collins, who in the last six games on the training trip made 21 hits—five home runs, two three base hits, four doubles and ten singles.

Collins whose name call him "Shano" for some mysterious and, to the reader, an entirely unimportant reason, was with the Sox last season, participating in more than 100 games and finishing with a batting average of .262, which would not indicate that he was a demon hitter.

But last fall Collins began to give an indication of something out of the ordinary and during the last thirty days of the season he hit hard and often.

Due to the watery condition of the

soil this spring, Collins had no chance to show sensational form in the war club until the Sox season started, when he began hitting like a fiend and Callahan considered taking him out of left field and sending Collins in. The necessity for an old head outwitted the value of the probable increase in hitting Collins would bring, so he was left upon the bench, at least temporarily.

Collins' form may be a flash in the pan, but the White Sox declare it is not. They say he has developed rapidly and has reached top form. They predict he will be the sensation in a league that boasts of such hitters as Cobb, Jackson, Cravens, Speaker, Lajoie and a few other shining lights if given a chance to play regularly.

Remember, these are spring days and they all look better than they may in August.
