Chatham, N. Opposition Stronghold is Captured
Voters of Charlo Hear Strong Presentation of Government's Case and will Vote the Ticket.

Charlo, Res. Co., June 16.—No better evidence is necessary of the wonderful strength being gained daily by the government forces in Restigouche County than the intently enthusiastic and well attended meeting in Charlo which was addressed by W. S. Montgomery and John MacNaughton, Mr. Montgomery, who was the first speaker, laid bare the record of Mr. LaBilloy as commissioner of public works showing it forth in all its glaring corruption and fictitious expenditure.
The auditor general's reports, declared the speaker, showed conclusively that Mr. LaBilloy was receiving an average of four dollars every day from the government for the work which he performed in his own store in Dalhousie. These four dollars were made in the report as travelling expenses. Mr. Montgomery gave such an able and clear cut analysis of the obvious mismanagement of the public works department under the ex-commissioner as to carry the audience completely off its feet.
The speaker in following arranged the Tweedie Purvis administration, the scandals of which had been supported by Mr. LaBilloy. He dealt exhaustively with every plank in the present government's platform, showing clearly that it has been the most honest and efficient government in the entire history of the province. For an hour and half he held his audience spell-bound and at the close of the meeting he received a hearty vote of thanks. This meeting was a telling blow to the opposition, as it was held supposedly in an opposition stronghold.

RESTIGOUCHE WILL BE SOLD FOR TICKET

Election of Messrs. Culligan and Stewart Assured — LaBilloy's and Colleagues Career Outlined by Speakers.

Dalhousie, June 16.—The liveliest and most demonstrative meeting in the entire campaign in Restigouche was held on Saturday night at Bel River Crossing where in former years Mr. LaBilloy invariably polled a large vote. If Saturday night's demonstration is any criterion, neither opposition candidate is likely to receive a single vote in that section. This meeting was addressed by Messrs. Richard, Shannon and Montgomery, all of whom were cheered to the echo. Every speech was punctuated by repeated outbursts of applause, and more than a hundred electors were unable to gain admission to the hall because of the large attendance, the building being crowded far beyond its utmost capacity and for hours the electors listened attentively and cheered repeatedly when the checked and unsuccessful career of Mr. LaBilloy was placed before them. The very mention of the name of LaBilloy was sufficient to elicit hisses and groans from the audience and that he will lose his deposit. Re-electing Mr. LaBilloy would unquestionably return two government supporters on Thursday next.
