SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS. THIS sale head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in the Dominion of Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at the office of any Local Agent of Dominion Lands (not sub-agent) on certain conditions. DATES—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land before the date of entry. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of 40 acres or more, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required in every case, except when residence is performed in the vicinity. A homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section of 64 acres, or more, from date of entry. DUTIES—Six months residence on the land, including the time required to secure a homestead, and a quarter-section of 64 acres or more, on certain conditions. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead rights and cannot obtain pre-emption may take a purchased homestead of 64 acres or more, on certain conditions. DUTIES—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivated 60 acres and erect house worth \$500. W. F. CORY, Deputy of the Minister of the Interior. N.
