Hon. W. T. White agreed with Mr. E. N. MacDonald that there was a good deal of truth in the statement that Canada had been slow in dealing with social reforms. Still he thought Mr. MacDonald's mind had been fixed too exclusively on the Dominion government. In Canada we had a federal system and charities were mentioned as being within the purview of the provinces. Mr. White said he did not cite this provision of the constitution to show that the Dominion might not provide for old age pensions. He cited it merely to direct attention to the part played by the provinces in dealing with the problem and to suggest that within the next few years a good deal might be expected from them in that direction. Another reason, indeed, the reason why. Mrs. Mary White.


