EASTERN TRUST HAD SUCCESSFUL YEAR

Halifax, Feb. 22.—Hector McInnes, K. C., presided for the first time at the annual meeting of the Eastern Trust Company, which was held this afternoon. The paid up capital of the company reached one million dollars during the year, and the net profits amounted to \$98,585. The sum of \$20,700 was transferred to the reserve making this \$260,000. When the company was established twenty-three years ago the paid up capital was \$26,400, the subscribed stock being \$110,000. The company's assets are \$1,276,826.

HIGH PRAISE FOR COL. MACLAREN

Canadian Medical Association Journal Pays Well Merited Tribute.

The following taken from the February number of the Canadian Medical Association Journal will be read with interest by the friends of Dr. Murray MacLaren in the city and province:

"The members of the Canadian Medical Association will be delighted to learn that their president, Dr. Murray MacLaren, has been honored by the King. Dr. MacLaren has been actively associated with the Canadian military organization for many years and was among the first, if not the first man, who signified his willingness and desire to do overseas work.

"Col. MacLaren, C. M. G., enjoyed a large practice in St. John and took a prominent part in the social life of his city in addition to his military duties. He has always been one of the most regular attendants at the meetings of the association and when he was elected to the presidency, the members generally felt that it was an honor well merited. Those who were present at the meeting at St. John will remember the excellent programme provided, and the unique and enjoyable social entertainment. His services overseas are rendered at considerable sacrifice and it is a great satisfaction to all his friends that his work as commanding officer of Number One Canadian General Hospital has been of such a high and efficient character that it has been recognized by the military authorities and the King. A man of few words but gentle presence, a judicial mind, and high ideals, he has fulfilled the arduous duties of a commanding officer with conspicuous ability. We understand Number One General Hospital has handled eleven or twelve thousand cases which is sufficient evidence that it was needed and that its equipment in personnel and appliances was of a high order."

8 DEAD, 50 HURT IN WRECK ON NEW HAVEN ROAD

Millford, Conn., Feb. 22.—Eight persons lost their lives and fifty fifty were more or less hurt in a rear end collision of passenger trains on the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad near here today. Four of the victims were railroad employes, two were passengers—a man and a woman—whose lives went out instantly in the terrible crash—and the others, also passengers, died in hospitals in Bridgeport and New Haven, where they had been taken.

The trains involved were No. 79, the Greenfield express, which is scheduled as the Connecticut River Special, and No. 5, a local train for way points between New Haven and New York.

A broken air hose on the express between the electric motor which was hauling it and the leading car stalled the train on the westerly end of a curve and rock out near the Woodmont station, and while there the local, which was following, rounded the curve and crashed into it at forty miles an hour.

It is claimed that W. R. Curtis, the engine man of No. 5, ran past a cautionary signal 2,000 feet in the rear of the express, and when he saw the home signal 300 feet in the rear of the stalled train he could not hold his train. In an instant it had rounded the curve, and not only were two passenger trains in confusion, but a freight train, which was passing west of the next track just at that moment, was buckled up by wreckage thrown upon it.

Gen. L. Tourtellette, flagman on the stalled train, met death in a sensational and heroic manner. According to the story told, Tourtellette went back with his red flag and saw the local approaching. He stood in the track, frantically waving the flag until it was too late to escape, and he was ground to death a moment before the fearful crash came.

Charles C. Elwell, a member of the Public Utilities Commission, who was soon at the scene of the wreck, said: "Inasmuch as the engineer, the fireman and the flagman, three important witnesses, are dead, it will be difficult to fix the blame, but a thorough investigation will probably be made and bring out the responsibility."

Both trains were well filled with passengers. Many Yale alumni were in No. 79, as they had attended Alumni Day at the university. They were returning to New York.

As the crash came the boiler of No. 5 exploded and, hurtling through the air over the freight on the next track to the eastbound track, dropped right side up at the bottom of the deep embankment. The bodies of the fireman and engine man, mangled and scalded, were picked out of the wreckage.

The rear coach of the express, split wide open, was thrown across the moving freight, falling over the eastbound tracks. Caught under it were the bodies of Miss Susan Hyland, of New Haven, and of a man believed to be Margros Der Hovhannesian, a graduate student of Yale.

Near a coach of the express escaped injury, the forward cars being jammed together.

Cordner Mix was among the early

arrivals. At the same time many physicians from New Haven and Bridgeport, with hospital nurses, were on the scene.

For several hours traffic was completely blocked.

The list of dead comprised: W. R. Curtis, engineer; George L. Tourtellette, flagman; Merrick, Miss; Patrick Collins, New York City, died in New Haven hospital; Miss Susan B. Hyland, New Haven; Charles E. Allen, Groton, Conn., died at New Haven hospital; Edward Modanis, fireman; male passenger, believed to be named Der Hovhannesian; one employe yet unidentified.
