The ministerial press has rushed to the defence of Lloyd George, charging that Asquith was using the Maurice letter as a political weapon to turn the government out. Another line taken is to emphasize the gravity of the military situation.

EIGHT U.S. SOLDIERS KILLED IN TEXAS

Two Trench Mortars Explode at Camp Bowie, Near Fort Worth-Seven Others Seriously Injured.

Fort Worth, Texas, May 8.—Eight American gunners were killed and seven injured more or less seriously near Benbrook, a few miles west of Fort Worth when a three-inch shell exploded at 3o'clock this afternoon. One gun crew made up of members of the headquarter's company of the 141st infantry, was entirely wiped out and a second crew from headquarter's company of the 152nd infantry suffered heavy casualties. Six of the men were killed instantly and two died within a short time. First reports that two trench mortars had exploded were erroneous.
