Will Assist The  
War Memorial FundExcellent Reports Received at  
Duke of Rothesay Chapter  
Annual Meeting.

With a certain amount of justifiable pride in their accomplishments and a firm determination to redouble their efforts in patriotic endeavors the Duke of Rothesay Chapter, I.O.D.E., began a new year yesterday, holding their annual meeting at the Consolidated school Mrs. W. S. Allison presided.

## Secretary's Report.

Mrs. John W. Davidson secretary, in her report stated that the chapter had supported a Victorian Order Nurse for nine months. In this time a great deal of child welfare work had been done. The chapter has held two pantry sales, two rummage sales and a Christmas sale; contributed to the salary of the kindergarten teacher at East St. John, given largely to the I.O.D.E. War Memorial scholarship fund; contributed to the prize for a returned soldier at U.N.B., and donated to nearly all the undertakings of the Order. Members have done their share whenever called upon for assistance.

## Treasurer's Statement.

Mrs. James Holly, treasurer, in her report stated that \$696.65 was the amount expended for charitable, educational and patriotic purposes during the year. To the War Memorial Scholarship \$200 was contributed; to the Victorian Order \$100, and \$175 to furnish a room in the Nurses Home. Relief was sent the St. Quentin fire sufferers.

The chapter has decided to give one-quarter of their earnings to the War Memorial fund. The retiring officers were heartily thanked for their interest and enthusiasm.

Burn Mortgage On  
Hillsboro ChurchSpecial Service to Mark Dawn  
of New Day for Baptist  
Cause.

Hillsboro, N. B., Feb. 3.—A very unusual celebration took place in the First Baptist church, Hillsboro, on Sunday evening last. The indebtedness of the church was in the form of seven notes of \$1,000 each; these notes were publicly burned, as they had been entirely paid.

This church was built in 1911 at a cost of nearly \$25,000, and it was necessary to place upon it a mortgage of \$7,000. To build the same building now it is estimated it would cost \$75,000.

The evening was fine, and over 500 people gathered to witness the celebration of the burning of the mortgage. It did the hearts of all good to see this large, modern church and vestry thronged with so many people. The former pastor, H. W. Cann, delivered the address of the evening. His address was full of reminiscences of the burning of the old church and the struggle to pay off the mortgage on the new church. He considered the church and Sunday school equipment one of the best and most modern in the province, and spoke of the pride in which the people would watch their seven papers burn.

Deacon G. P. Steeves then called upon Mr. E. C. Bishop to recount the burning of the old church and the building of the new. His account was as fresh as if it had occurred yesterday.

The pastor, Rev. A. S. Bishop, spoke a few moments, and said that now when the mortgage is removed the church ought not to become "The Church of Heavenly Hosts," but rather of "Greater Tasks Ahead."

A letter of regret on account of inability to be present was read from Rev. E. B. McLatchey, of Perth, N. B., who has been closely associated with Hillsboro all his life. The first note was burned by the oldest member, Deacon E. C. Bishop, the second by the pastor, Rev. A. S. Bishop, the third by Rev. H. W. Cann, the former pastor; the fourth by J. Dimock Steeves, one of the signers of the notes; the fifth by Capt. C. T. Wood, another signer; the sixth by Mrs. John I. Peck, representing the ladies and their share in wiping out the mortgage; the seventh was burned by Mr. John T. Steeves, who was very largely responsible for the raising of the last twelve months \$5,000, in order to complete the amount required. The honor of the occasion was due to him.

Rev. G. W. Tilley brought the congratulations of the Methodists of the village. He was ever more pleased with the immediate prospect of a building, a well-equipped structure, suitable for carrying on all the young people's work of the community. It will mean much to Hillsboro's young people and future.

While in sympathy with both resolutions, they were laid on the table to be discussed at the next general meeting. Mrs. J. H. Dwyer and Miss C. McGivern were appointed to represent the club in appearing before the mayor to speak in support of Vocational Training.


