**WRATHY CITIZENS LOSE HALF DAY FROM WORK ONLY TO FIND NAMES ALREADY ON VOTERS' LIST**

**Man, Wife and Two Daughters, Bearing Cards From the Temperance Forces, Find Names in Black and White—Enough To Drive Man To Drink, Declares Citizen With Much Heat—313 People Register Up To Date.**

Sixty-seven names were added to the city's voters' list this morning by the court of revision sitting in each of the four divisions of the city. The names to be added to the list to be used in the Canada temperance act referendum, to be held during April. Up to noon today a total of 1000 applicants had appeared before the board.

This morning's session proved the busiest of the court's sessions on Monday. While not as many names were added as on Tuesday afternoon, the offices were crowded during the greater part of the day. In the afternoon, information, the majority of whom were indignant.
