of the railing $F$. which runs around all the walls and uprights. G. Table.

In this library, books are not allowed to go out but in cases of necessity, and then the person who takes them has to give a receipt, which is returued to him when the volumes are brought back.

The further prosecution of the preceding ideas of the structure of the building for a library, according to the claims of our times, ought of course to be lett to practical architects.
