The Presidents of Men's and Women's Athletics should have seats on council to represent and receive student opinion on athletic matters just as a Students' Council member now sits on the UAB.

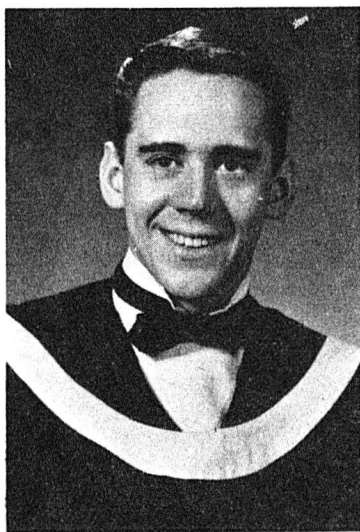

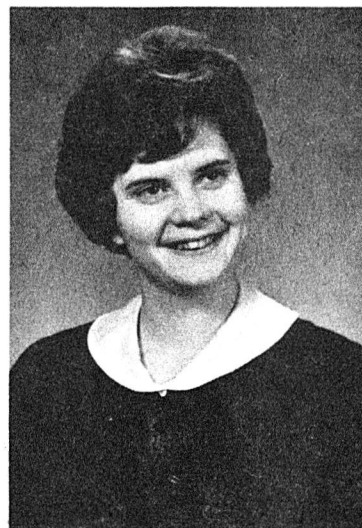

- that the Wauneita Service Corps be expanded to give more girls the opportunity to serve in campus activities.
