The British-American Oil Company Refinery, which cost \$9 million to build, opened in Clarkson. The opening was expected to make the Port Credit area a major industrial and to provide employment opportunities for many area residents. Houses for 50 families were being rushed to completion near the plant, the largest of its type in Canada.

Bridge

By and large, the world's top-ranking bridge players are nice guys and gals when removed from the bridge table. But at the table, it is often another matter, for when they are pre-occupied with the stresses and strains of tournament play, they are completely immersed in their "work"; and they often don't have the time to be pleasant to "outsiders."

At the National Championships held this past summer in Washington, D.C., a lady approached Tournament Director Phil Wood and inquired: "Is there a famous and nice expert I could kibitz?" Phil replied: "What kind do you want? Nice of famous? We don't have both."

Actually Phil was wrong — there were a couple of nice and famous experts around. One of them was internationalist Norman Kay, of Philadelphia. Here is an example of Kay in action. Admittedly, he wasn't nice to his opponents, but while precariously walking a tight-rope, he had no time to be nice to anyone. Kay was sitting South.

On West's opening lead of the diamond king, East initiated a "come-on" signal by playing the eight. West continued with the diamond ace, East dropping the deuce. To trick three West led the diamond jack, Kay ruffing with dummy's queen. East discarded the deuce of clubs.

The "normal" play at this point would be to lead a trump off dummy. Had Kay done this he would have gone down, for West, upon taking his ace (which he figured to have for his bid), would have returned a diamond, which East would have ruffed.

At trick four declarer led a spade to his king, after which he played back the spade ten, which he overtook with dummy's ace. Then, with his heart in his mouth, he led the queen of spades. When East followed suit, declarer discarded his remaining diamond.

Now, at long last, he led a trump off dummy. South's king being taken by West's ace. Whatever West now played back, he could not prevent declarer from making the rest of the tricks (if a fourth diamond were led, South would overruff East).

Incidentally, if there are those who think that East could have defeated the

contract by discarding a spade (instead of a club) on the third diamond lead, they are in error. Declarer would still have made his contract by overruffing East, and then laying down the trump king.

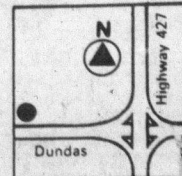
