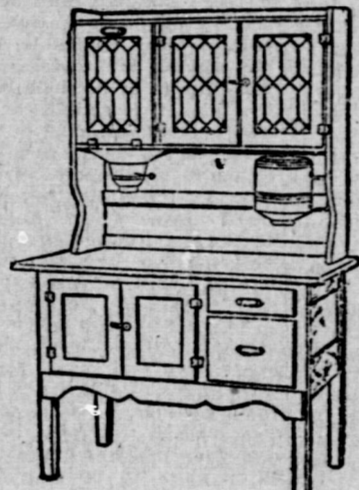

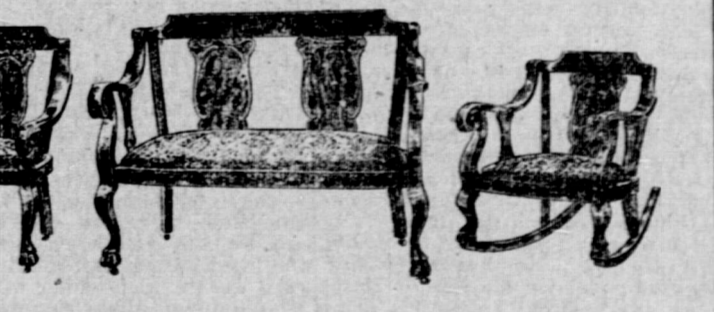

U. S. ARMY BILL CALLS ON MALES 19 YEARS OF AGE

Drastic Changes Proposed in Measure Providing for Universal Military Training. Raise 500,000 Annually.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—The universal training plan of the general staff of the army was submitted to congress today by President Wilson. War department officials say the plan, if put into effect, would raise and train an army of 500,000 men every year. The resume of the bill as prepared by Major McArthur of the staff, reads: "The plan calls out all able male citizens in their 19th year for eleven months for continuous training, to be followed by two repetition courses of two weeks each, one in their 20th year and one in their 21st year. "It is proposed that the following classes be exempted: "Those permanently physically or mentally unfit for service of any kind to be permanently rejected; those temporarily physically or mentally unfit to be temporarily rejected; those to be re-examined each year until they reach the age of 25 when they are permanently assigned to the unorganized reserves; if in any year during this period they are found fit for service they will be called out for training in peace and service in time of war with the class of that year; those who are the sole support of destitute dependents will be exempted for one year and so on from year to year, until they reach the age of 25, when their liability to training ceases and they are assigned permanently to the unorganized reserves; if the last mentioned cease to be the sole support of destitute dependents before they reach the age of 25, they will be called out for training and service with the class of that year. "Service in the war shall be as follows: "All non-exempted physically and mentally fit male citizens who have completed their subscribed eleven months' continuous training are liable for service as reserves as follows: "In the first reserve for four years and one month; in the second reserve for seven years; thereafter, until they reach the age of 45 in the organized reserves. "In case of actual or threatened war, first and second reserves will be called out in the order named, together with many permanent officers and enlisted men of the training forces; thereafter others required would be called out from the unorganized reserves. "All persons commissioned, enlisted or enrolled at the outbreak of war, or when war is imminent may be retained in the service until the end of the war or until danger of the war disappears. "Among those exempted in time of war are those whose official positions are indispensably necessary for conduct of the federal and state governments and for the prosecution of the war." MAY DEFER USING OVERLAND PIPE ON ACCOUNT OF POWER

Suggestion to Continue Present Supply Till Electric Generating Plant is Developed by City.

That the overland pipe may not be put into commission for a year, is the opinion expressed around the city hall. It is expected that the pipe and pump house will be ready by May 1, but the trouble is over the power for operating the pumps at Lenioux island. The city as yet has no agreement for power and it is feared that any rate which can be secured will be so high that an increase in the water rates would be imperative. The alternative is for the city to utilize its water power at the Queen street pumping station for the generating of electricity for transmission to Lenioux island. But because the councils of the last two years did not deal with the power question practically nothing has yet been done. It will take a year to develop the water power for electricity. In view of the fact that the general tax rate will have to be increased this year, there is a general disposition against increasing the water rates as well. If the present tap water continues to show such excellent purity, there are some who favor just continuing it until the city develops its own power. This development would not interfere with the operation of the pumps. When the electric plant was developed, the water could simply be turned from one set of wheels to the other.

THRILLING "MYSTERY" OF A "MISSING" GIRL

Was Safe at the Y.W.C.A.' While Newspaper Sleuths Sought for a Clue.

There is no foundation for the sensational story which has been published in a local contemporary about the supposed mysterious disappearance of "Miss Mary Daoust," who is alleged to have been missing since February 8th. The young lady, whose proper name by the way is Irma Dow, is and has been employed at the Young Women's Christian Association on Metcalfe street, since Feb. 19th, two days after her alleged disappearance. Miss Dow is at a loss to understand how the story came to be published and also feels keenly the notoriety to which she has been subjected, especially as her parents at Angers, Que., her aunt in Hull and also her soldier brother have been fully aware of where she was staying. "I do not understand how this story came to be spread around about me," stated Miss Dow to a Citizen representative who waited upon her at the Y.W.C.A. yesterday morning. "I was staying with my aunt at 31 Claxton street, Wrightville, Hull, until Feb. 8th, when I crossed to Ottawa to take a position with Mr. and Mrs. Martin Rosenthal, in company with my sister, Miss Jennie Dow, who is shortly to be married. A lady friend of mine told me she could procure me another position and I stayed with her until Feb. 10th, when I took this position and have been here ever since. It is true I live at Angers, Que., and my parents knew where I was, as I wrote to them the day after I took this position. My brother also visited me often, and my aunt knew where I was, so I cannot understand how I could have been made to disappear. I think it is too bad that such a story should have been written about me when it is not true." Miss Sutcliffe, the superintendent at the Y. W. C. A., spoke very well of Miss Dow, and corroborated the statement by the latter that she had been employed there since Feb. 19th. The facts are that the young woman has been in Ottawa all the time, that since Feb. 19 she has been working at the Y. W. C. A. and that her relatives have known of her whereabouts since a day after she took the position.

Family's Sad Plight.

WINDSOR, Ont., Feb. 23.—Mabel Pastorius, aged 14, died this morning of burns received Thursday afternoon when her clothing caught fire. Her brother Walter, 17, is in a serious condition in a hospital as a result of injuries sustained while trying to extinguish his sister's burning clothes. The family moved to Windsor from the country eleven months ago and only two months ago the dead girl's father, George Pastorius, was instantly killed by a street car.

Killed by Tree.

LONDON, Ont., Feb. 23.—Frederick Nichols was instantly killed when a large tree fell on him in a bush in Addborough township. He was superintendent of the woodcutters of the Rodney Woodware Company.
