

Sister Adelin is in charge of the senior class room, while Sister Carrier teaches the juniors. Neither sister has a certificate, but are doing good work, Sister Adelin especially who has her classes well in hand, and well disciplined. There are 67 pupils in the school, but of this 67 only 22 are children of treaty Indians. The other 45 are halfbreed from Canoe Lake, English River, Snake Lake, Portage la Loche and from around Beauval. It seems deplorable that this school should be filled with halfbreeds when it could easily be filled with treaty Indian children from Canoe Lake, Clear Lake, Portage la Loche and English River Bands, all of whom are Roman Catholic.

The school is kept very clean; The pupils well clothed and apparently well fed, as they all looked fat and healthy. The girls are taught to do housework, sewing, cooking, knitting etc. besides the class room work. The boys are taught farming, the care of stock, work around a saw mill. The saw mill is situated on the La Plonge River beside a waterfall which supplies the power. This fall drives the mill and matching machines. An extra flume is connected with a turbine wheel beneath a work shop, in which are installed, re sawing machines, planers, matchers, lathes, pumps and a dynamo. All this machinery is driven
