A. 163	I base it on, first, when I had an interview with Col Turcot and he is still waiting for me, and at the time I was AWL, I was in Quebec in order to contact a firm and I happened to meet in the Street the RSM of the Royal 22e Regt, RSM Hache and I said to him "what about that job, is it still open up there"? and the answer was "yes" it is still open', they are still waiting for me.
Q. 164	After your apprehension by the Provost in Quebec, when were you first arraigned before your OC?
A. 164	I was arraigned the next day on the 7th if I remember right, in the morning at 1100 hours.
Q. 165	What happened on this date, the 7 Apr 49?
A. 165	Well, I was brought in front of Major Robert, the OC 4 Section A&T Staff and he read to me the charge as laid down in front of this court and he asked me what I had to say. I told him the same I have been saying and asked you for the last six months "My transfer or my discharge".

Q. 167	When you were brought up on the 8th what transpired then?
A. 167	On the 8th April I was brought up in front of the OC Major Robert. He asked me if I had any complaints without reading the charge. He asked me if I wanted to see my wife and before I had the time to answer he turned around to me in French "vous n'êtes pas inté- ressé" before I had a chance to answer if I wanted to see my wife or not.
Q. 168	What was the relationship between yourself and Major Robert?
A. 168	He is my O.C., Sir.
