At the conclusion of the services, the pallbearers bore the coffin to the hearse in waiting, while the Sisters and visitors, with lighted tapers, knelt along the route to the convent gate. The remains were conveyed to Niagara Falls on the 12.20 train, accompanied by a special draped car conveying those in attendance, the pallbearers, Religious and several Priests who formed an escort. They were met at the Niagara Depot by M. Regis Harris, of Loretto Convent, Niagara Falls, and M. Eucharistia Magann, Superior of Joliet, at the time. On the arrival of the party at Niagara, pallbearers from Niagara Falls joined in the procession, the Toronto pallbearers following next to the remains; then came the Priests, and after them the Religious, in all making a very solemn funeral cortege. The line of carriages slowly wended its way around the banks of the majestic Niagara, over which she had so often driven in her visits of charity and love, to the Loretto
