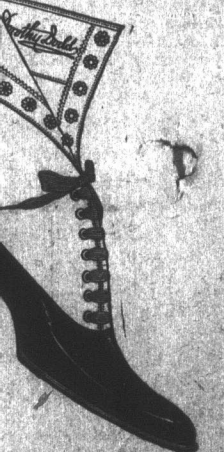

ASKED INVESTIGATION

As reported in Saturday's Planet
a meeting of the West Kent License
Commissioners was held on Saturday
last. Since the action of the Com-
missioners has become public very
serious allegations have been made
regarding the applicants for shop
license and renewal license and the
manner in which the respective
claims were presented.

While, of course, allowance must
be made for the exaggeration and
misrepresentation of mere street
rumors, yet these allegations were
of so serious a character that the
executive of the Conservative Asso-
ciation felt it their duty, after con-
sultation with some of the leading
men both in the city and in the out-
lying parts of the constituency, to
call an executive meeting to deal
promptly with the matter.

A two-fold duty was to be per-
formed, viz., that of protecting the
public from dishonest officials if such
there were, and that of protecting
the character of the officials from
slandorous or unwarranted state-
ments from ill-advised or disappoint-
ed individuals.

With this thought in mind an
executive meeting was called at
which Mr. Clancy was present. Per-
fect harmony prevailed and the sub-
ject of the alleged charge was alone
discussed. The Commissioners were
all present and made most frank and
emphatic denials to the reports cir-
culated and asked that the fullest
investigation be instituted. This was
deemed the wisest thing to do and
the Provincial Secretary was com-
municated with and immediately ac-
ceded to the suggestion of the executive,
assuring them that a thorough and
impartial investigation would be
forthwith instituted.

Until such time as this investiga-
tion—which starts immediately—is
concluded further comment would be
out of place.

It may be stated that the execu-
tive did not call in question any of
the rulings of the Commissioners re-
garding the granting or withholding
of any of the licenses.
