The new \$4,000 Catholic church at Brandon
was consecrated by Archbishop
Langrvin.

The August collection of duties at the
port of Toronto was \$78,282, an increase
of \$12,182 over August last year.

The third race for the America Cup was
not finished within the time limit, and an
attempt will be made to sail it to-day.

Mrs. Janaschek, famous for many
years as an actress, but who for some
time has suffered from paralysis, is dying
in New York.

Manitoba Liberals have filed petitions
against the return of Mr. S. Walker,
Winnipeg North, and Premier Roblin,
Dufferin, and ask for disqualification of
the Premier.

The Crown Lands Department has
received 8,000 applications so far for
military land grants. Only 3,000 of
these have been applied for locations of
their grants. Some 12,000 in all is the
total possible number of grants.

Jacob Gruhler of the Sacramento Hel-
vetia Shooting Club has broken the
world's shooting record at 300 yards, Ger-
man 35-ring target, by making 48 out of a
possible 500. The record, heretofore held
by Dr. Rogers of San Francisco, was 461
out of 500. Mr. Gruhler's shooting was
off-hand.
