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ooke of the efforts he pointed to the rlooked by newer ares of this Society the circulation of e—especially tracts of a pure evangelical character. There is also the spoken word by the colporteurs. The services of colporteurs are specially useful in scattered and isolated districts. He regretted the limited number of agents in the field, and expressed the hope that larger liberality on the part of the public would justify expansion. Seconded by W. H. WISWELL, Esq. Passed unanimously.

REV. J. S. BLACK expressed his deep interest in this Society and similar organizations.

On motion of Rev. John MacMillan, the Officers for the ensuing year were duly elected. The meeting closed with prayer by Rev. F. H. Almon.
