Stockyard Receipts

The receipts during the past week at the two local stockyards have been as follows: Union stockyards, 1,096 cattle, 10,994 hogs, 185 sheep, and 116 calves. At the C.P.R. yards, 218 cattle, 849 hogs and 247 sheep.

Cattle

Cattle

There has been a firm tone pervading the market during the past week and with moderate offerings the price has been holding to that quoted last week. There have been no very choice cattle for sale with the exception of one very fine string of grass fed cattle from the West, which was eagerly snapped up — the steers selling around 8 cents and the heifers 7 cents. The majority of the offerings, however, have been of the half-fat kind, most of them coming between the butcher and feeder classes. There has been an upward tendency in prices paid for choice offerings and in sympathy with the Southern markets the price has advanced in some cases 25 cents. Female stock is selling just about the same and bulls are from 15 to 25 cents lower. Other than the extra choice steers available sold around \$7.75, and altho the demand is good for well finished stock, it is not advisable to buy half finished stuff in the country with the idea of disposing of it at a profit in the Winnipeg market. However, the war news is bound to have an effect upon the livestock market sooner or later and it is advisable that a close watch be kept upon prices in order that the farmer may benefit as much as possible from the present circumstances. Stockers and feeders have shown little change and since the crop is short this year it is just possible that cattlemen will be forced to dispose of a large proportion of their stock due to shortage of feed. This being the case the market will probably become lower so that just at present it is not possible to predict the trend of prices. At any rate it is certain that quality will be a big factor in the stocker line this season and dehorned cattle will obtain the preference, so that it would be well for buyers to govern themselves accordingly. There has been good demand for common and undersized cows. Choice springers all markets the seasches here and sheary calves 6½ to 7 cents.

Hogs

Hogs

The hog market has been steady during the larger portion of the week, with a tendency towards a drop in prices. The Southern markets have weakened considerably and local buyers today (Monday) are offering \$8 15 instead of the former price of \$8.25 earlier in the week. The market is not at all settled just now and it is advisable to buy at country points with a falling market in view. Just how long this condition will continue will depend upon the influence which the present war scare will have on the markets.

Sheep

Offerings have been as usual quite light, best sheep selling around 5\frac{1}{2} to 6 cents, and lambs 7 to 8 cents, depending upon weight and quality.

Country Produce

Note.—Quotations are f.o.b. Winnipeg, except those for cream, which are f.o.b. point of shipment.

Butter
The price of butter this week remains unchanged, 20 cents being paid for Fancy Dairy, No. 1 Dairy selling for 18 cents and good round lots for from 14 to 15 cents.

Eggs

The produce market has not very much range from week to week, prices have been much the same in nearly all departments. Eggs are 16 to 18 cents now, all shipments being subjected to strict candling.

Potatoes

The local supply of potatoes is almost negligible at present and it is probable that the same price will hold good for a couple of weeks. Just now 95 cents per bushel is quoted by dealers.

Milk and Cream

As was noted in last week's market page, the price of sweet cream advanced during the week and it now stands at 30 cents per pound of butterfat. The price for sour cream is still 19 to 20 cents, but dealers state that this price will advance also within the course of a few days. The price for milk is 81.65 this month.

Hay

The hay market is just about stationary, althout is probable that prices will drop shortly. Just now shipments of new hay are not heavy and as a consequence the price remains at its usual figure. Last year about this time the shipments were very heavy and a rapid decline in prices was the result. Just now the market is ateady with a very even tone. Price for Timothy ranges from 816 to 818, for Red Top from 811 to \$12, for Upland from 810 to 812 and for Midland from 88 to \$10 per ton.
