#### Were Withdrawn Before Attacks of Superior Forces

Says Troops In Fogaris Region Fall Back Before Superior **Enemy Forces** 

BUCHAREST, Oct. 7 .- Roumanian troops have withdrawn from their positions in the region of Fogaris, in Transylvania, before attacks of superior forces, says an official statement issued by the War Office to-day. Violent engagements continue in other sections of Transylvania. On the northern front there has been violent engagements in the Upper Lirneva and Tirna Valleys, the enemy having attacked with superior forces in the region of Fogaris and Viradini, our troops have been withdrawn somewhat.
