Do Not Want Help Till Harvest
When the Production Club's note re urban assistance on the farm was called, "God help the farmer," said Ex. Mr. McEwen, "McEwen, I am not stopping on their toes, they are good men in their own place." Another suggested, "There are so many town gardens, that citizens will not have time to help outside." Mr. Lawrence spoke of a labor at 15 cents an hour, without board by a group of laborers out of his way. Another thought there was more crop in than the farmers could take off. COALITION IS OFF
Laurier Did Not Agree to Proposal
A JOINT STATEMENT
By Both Leaders in the Commons To-day

Ottawa, June 7.—Formal announcement of the outcome of the negotiations which have been in progress between Sir Robert Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier for the past ten days will be made today. In the meantime neither leader has given any intimation of what the nature of that announcement will be. Nevertheless, the report was widely circulated here last night that coalition by agreement between the Parliamentary chiefs of the two great parties was not to be. Sir Robert Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier conferred again at the Prime Minister's office in the east block at noon yesterday and at the termination of the interview neither would make any statement as to its result. It was not long, however, before the rumor spread that the two leaders had agreed to a joint statement to be made in the Commons today. That statement will probably be followed by declarations of policy by both Sir Robert and Sir Wilfrid. The meeting of the House will be preceded by caucuses of both parties.

Opposed to Conscription.
Liberals here are predicting that Sir Wilfrid will, in his address, express opposition to both the military service bill and the extension of the Parliamentary term. He will call for another trial of the voluntary system of enlistment, and point to the reserves in Canada and the opposition rate of recruiting as sufficient to provide reinforcements for the Canadian divisions in France in the immediate future.

He will then pledge himself to support some form of universal service in the event of the failure of voluntary enlistment. Liberals for conscription. It is asserted here that the government Military Service Bill will receive considerable support from the Liberal side of the House of Commons. Some say seven Western members, five Ontario representatives, two from New Brunswick, and one from Nova Scotia on the Opposition benches will cast their votes in favor of the measure. There is even a possibility, it is said, that two moderate Western and two English-speaking Liberals from Quebec may give their support to the government, which will have more than its normal majority.

The French-Canadian Conservatives oppose the bill, a very doubtful contingency, if reorganized. Sir Wilfrid's rejection of the Prime Minister's proposals will not, it is stated, prevent reorganization of the ministry. The question now canvassed is whether the new government will be a party government or a Unionist government. There is discussion of the possibility of six or seven prominent Liberals in Parliament or outside of it, who are in favor of utilizing the power of the State to provide reinforcements for the force at the front, being invited to join the Cabinet.

Swayed by Quebec.
Referred to the reasons for Sir Wilfrid Laurier's reported rejection of Sir Robert Borden's proposals. It is pointed out that the Prime Minister offered a coalition on very generous terms, and the belief is expressed that the Liberal leader was simply influenced by pressure from his Quebec supporters. It will doubtless be explained that he was moved by "a conviction that a Coalition Government would not be feasible and so favored a decision upon the conscription issue at the polls."

INDEPENDENT OF PROVINCE
By Corlier Leased Wire.
Victoria, B.C., June 7.—When the Canadian Northern Railway was built through British Columbia, it was agreed with the provincial government that the latter by virtue of a large subsidy would have control of rates. Hon. John Oliver early this year sought, as Minister of Railways, to regulate the Canadian Northern rates, but Sir William MacKenzie replied that the Canadian Northern, having received assistance, was now responsible only to the Federal Railway commission in matter of rates, and this contention was strengthened here yesterday by a remark of Sir Henry Drayton, Chairman of the railway commission, that he thought the Dominion was relieving the Province of its obligations in connection
