WHITE PASS FREIGHT RATES

New Schedule Arrives Which Will Govern Shipments for Coming Season—Minimum Rate Fixed at \$3.75—Special Rates on Large Shipments.

The White Pass line have issued their annual freight tariff sheet a copy of which has been received at the local office.

The most important rates quoted are on "special commodities" which include nearly all shipments made in this country.

GROUP 1. Flour, cereals, rice and rice flour, tapioca and tapioca flour, sago and sago flour, salt, sugar and beans in sacks or barrels, canned goods, boxed or described in the classification (thermally sealed), and butter in brine...

GROUP 2. Soap, starch, syrup, and all articles under the heading of "groceries" in the classification taking Class A rates; also soda, lard, vinegar, jellies and preserves (in wood), fish, dry, pickled or smoked; pork and beef pickled in wood; pickles (in wood) and mince meat in straight or mixed lots of not less than 20,000 lbs.

GROUP 3. Baking powder, candies, bluing, chocolate, cocoa, coffee, macaroni, semolina, spaghetti, yeast cakes and all articles enumerated in the classification under "groceries" taking Class B rates; also raisins, prunes, dried fruits, pickles, jellies and preserves in glass; beef, dried, chipped or smoked, in boxes or barrels; also table sauces, including pepper sauce, ketchup, horse radish, salad dressing, wild oil, mustard (prepared in glass) and straight or mixed lots of not less than 20,000 lbs.

GROUP 4. Crackers, spices, tea and articles under "groceries" in the classification taking Class C rates; also matches, in straight or mixed lots of not less than 20,000 lbs.

GROUP 5. All articles as described in the classification under "hardware" taking Class A rates; also the following articles handled by hardware houses: Asbestos cement, asbestos wall plaster, asphaltum, asphaltum coating, axle grease, tires (carriage or wagon), rabbit net, bags and bagging, bath brick, blacksmiths' coal (sacked), blocks (pullers or tackle), blue stone (or coral), boiler and pipe covering, boiler compound, borax, building and roofing paper and felt, carriage goods and bent stuff in the white, c...
