BITUMINOUS BASE WINS BY ONE VOTE

CLOSE VOTING ON QUESTION OF PAVEMENT FOUNDATIONS. REPORT ADOPTED.

By a vote of five to four Ald. Gillespie last evening succeeded in getting his report recommending the letting of a contract for 32,150 square yards of paving on a bituminous base to the Bitumithic and Contracting Limited, through the Council.

Contrary to expectations and to the decision that it was generally understood was arrived at at last Friday's meeting of the Board of Works, the report made no attempt at a compromise by a modification of the bituminous foundation by making it all crushed stone in place of half gravel and half stone, the clause simple reading:

(1) That the tender of the Bitumithic and Contracting Ltd., to lay bitumithic pavements on a bituminous foundation at \$3.37 per square yard be accepted for the following streets and quantities:

Table with 2 columns: Street Name and Quantity. Includes Broad St., Victoria and Eleventh, Malheur St., South Railway and Victoria, Oiler St., Tenth and Eleventh, Eleventh, Broad and Oiler, Tenth, Oiler and Halifax, Twelfth, Broad and Albert, Smith St., South Railway and Victoria.

The amendment was seconded by Ald. L. T. McDonald and opposed by Ald. Gillespie and Thomson, and upon being put to the vote was declared lost by 5 to 3.

The motion was then put and declared carried by 5 to 4. His Worship asking the Clerk to record his vote against it. The following was the vote:

For Bituminous Base. Ald. Gillespie, Kramer, Ball Thomson and Kusch.

Against Bituminous Base. Mayor Smith, Ald. Feyerick, Cowan, L. T. McDonald.

The remainder of the report then carried without discussion, including the clause accepting the tender of Messrs. Langley and Cook to lay asphalt block pavement on a concrete foundation for \$3.96 per square yard.
