A tombstone of a remarkable characteristics ter was recently discover d in the southern transept of the old Abbey church of St. Mary's, New Ross. The Model Class..... 45c discovery was made by the versatile ence of which appears to be unknown, discloses the fact that the stone-cuttdiscloses the fact that the stone-cutt-ing and sculptural art in New Ross was in a highly developed state just three hundred years ago. The stone in question consists of a fine kind of granite and sets forth in a Latin bor-der inscription the fact that it was laid to the memory of John Neyill, sover-eign of Ross, who died in the year 1687.
