Hankow, China,

Editor of the Athens Reporter,

A tew days ago I receive la bunothers was a copy of the Athens Reporter which some kind friend was thoughtfluly enough to send me. [ thought perhaps it might interest you how your paper travels to the remotes parts of the earth bringing cheer and comfort to a great many men who have some time in their life lived at or near Athens, and who in the pursuit of bus iness are scattered world wide.

For nearly two years I have been practically isolated here in China, as my business compells me to live at a s nall village seven miles out in the country from Hankow.

I am the only foreigner here and I get very lonesome some times with no one to speak to from one week to another. I have with me two Chinese who understand euough English to get along in business but not enough to carry on a conversation so you will readily see how I appreciate the news papers. I have been kept well supplied with papers from America such as the New York, Montreal, and Toronto papers but none of them ever seemed much like getting news from home as your paper the Reporter.
