The Mines Are Closed and the Men Living on Charity.

Boers Pushing on Their Earthworks and Shelling the Town.

Kimberley, Thursday, Nov. 9, evening, via Hopetown, Sunday, Nov. 12.-The Boers wers busy yesterday in The Boers wets busy yesterday in throwing up fresh earthworks. There has been no further bombardment. The mines are practically closed. Thousands of the employes are now domiciled in the centre of the town, and are being previsioned by the mayor's relief fund. The military authorities have ordered all civilians to give up their arms and ammunition, with a view of preventing irresponsible firing at the Boers in contravention of the laws of civilized warfare. Natives report that the Boers fare. Natives report that the Boers cheered each shell as it was fired yesterday, believing it meant the destruction of Kimberley. The Boers are now wearing khaki uniforms and blue puggarees, making it difficut to distinguish them from the British.

Locusts are appearing.

The announcement of the arrival of Gen. Methuen at Orange River, doubtless means that arrangements are in a forward state for an advance from that point, if the advance has not already begun. Kimberley was safe on Friday, Nov. 10. Last Tuesday a Boer force of six bundred entered Allwai North, Cape Colony, and hoisted the fing of the Republic. The activity of the Boers in this locality would almost point to the necessity of insuring the safety of the column marching to the relief of Kimberley from attacks from this direction or Bloemfontein.


