CITY IS HEALTHY.

No Cases of Contagious Disease
Reported During September.

A Legal Account for the Hansboro Case Gives the Board of Health a Shock.

The Board of health met Monday afternoon. There were present Chairman Dunlop, Dr. R. V. Bray, O. B. Hulm, Robert Pritchard, Bishop Wilmore and Medical Health Officer, Dr. Hall, and Health Inspector Guttridge.

Dr. R. V. Bray's expenses, \$8, in connection with the Hansboro suit, were ordered paid.
An account from Dr. Backus, \$4.50, was ordered paid.
Dr. Hall reported that during September there were no contagious diseases in the city.

Lewis & Richards wrote on behalf of A. G. Peate, who resides on Adelaide street, complaining of a nuisance. Mr. Peate, they said, had purchased a lot from Mrs. Campbell and erected a dwelling on it. The manure from Mr. Campbell's stable was only distant from Mr. Peate's residence 30 feet. The offensive odors found their way through the house, and rendered life almost unbearable. In addition there was much annoyance caused by flies. Mr. Peate claimed that the health of at least two members of his family had already been materially affected by it, and he asked the board to take steps to give him relief. The letter was referred to the inspector.

Health Inspector Guttridge reported that he had disinfected one house on Bedford street, in which there had been diphtheria, also one house on Park avenue, on account of scarlet fever, and a house on Victoria avenue, for diphtheria. All these cases occurred in August.

He had heard no complaints in reference to the cattle yards of the C. P. R. and G. T. R. but had visited them time and again. Corporation workmen were engaged flushing sewers on different streets.

The report was adopted.
Dr. Bray, for the committee on by-laws reported that the council be asked to alter the by-laws re cutting ice, passed by them last fall, so that it would read as the original draft passed by the board was worded.

No action was recommended at present in reference to plumbing by-law. Report adopted.

Wilson, Kerr & Pike sent in their bill of costs in connection with the Hansboro vs. Board of Health suit, and the account came in for some criticism. The amount of the account was \$178.81. One member remarked that the next time it would be better to let the suit go with out quarantining, and let the doctors have a chance at the bills.

On motion of Mr. Hulm, Mr. Pritchard, Mr. Dunlop and Bishop Wilmore were appointed a committee to confer with the finance committee of the city council in reference to the account.

The board then adjourned.

THE CITY COUNCIL.

Some Changes Made in the Fire Brigade.

An Inspector of Bricks Appointed—Miscellaneous Business Transacted by the Council.

The city council held its regular meeting last evening. There were present, Ald. Liddy, Dr. Fleming, McKeough, Marshall, McGo, Stephens and Sulman, City Clerk Merritt, Mayor Weir and Sergeant-at-Arms Holmes. In the absence of the Mayor Ald. Sulman was moved to the chair.

Ald. Sulman made a good mayor and rushed everything through so that the session was over about 9.45.

Henry Crump asked that a dead tree on Pine St. be given to him for the wood in it. Granted.

D. W. Crow requested permission to build a 4-foot plank walk outside the trees in front of his property on Emma St. Referred to the board of works.

Samuel Holmes, Lydia Northwood, B. K. Harper and J. T. Holmes asked that the granolithic walk in front of their property on King St. be put out side the trees along the curb. Request granted.

Chas. Le Francis, Lacroix St., asked \$10 for damage done to goods by fire in the building being flooded when the Edgar street sewer was flushed. The claim was referred to the finance committee.

Mrs. Bass, St. George street, asked permission to have a tree cut. Referred to the Chief of Police.

The G. T. R. wrote in regard to the opening up of St. Patrick street across their track. They asked for a map of the proposed extension. The city clerk was instructed to furnish the G. T. R. with the necessary information.

W. R. Phillimore requested permission to trim trees on Wellington St. in front of his new residence. Referred to the Chief of Police.

The T. H. Taylor Co. wrote, stating that they had signed the petition presented to the council some time before in reference to the blocking of Colborne St. by the Lake Erie. The Taylor Co. said that they desired to state that the Lake Erie had remedied the evil complained of in the petition at great expense. Filed.

The resignation of Thomas Taylor from the fire department was accepted. Chief Jacques wrote recommending that Alex. Holmes be appointed to Taylor's place, Chas. Ryall be promoted to Holmes' place, and Harry Johnston be promoted to Ryall's position. The request of the chief was granted.

The West Kent Agricultural Society wrote asking for light fee of charge. Granted.

M. Wilson, Q. C., wrote that he had perused the agreement between the city and the Bell Telephone Co., re the fire alarm system, and had found that no provision was made for the extension of the service or the moving of the boxes. The agreement defined a specific number of boxes and their location and does not allow the city to change.

Mr. Wilson said that it might be well for the city to at once meet the Bell Telephone Company and to arrange some amicable settlement whereby the city would be able to extend their service. Referred to the property committee.

On motion of Ald. Liddy, seconded by Ald. McKeough, a delegation from the West Kent Agricultural Society was heard. The members of the delegation were, Chas. Austin, Spencer Stone, Walter Scane, John Mount and Secretary Robinson.

Mr. Austin was the first speaker. He said that the delegation appeared on behalf of the West Kent Agricultural Society, to request material assistance for the coming Fair. It was unanimous for him to go to any details as far as the good results that would accrue.

Ald. Liddy asked what had been done in regard to the dead end on Colborne St.

Ald. Sulman said that Mr. Woollett was expected in the city shortly, and the committee were waiting to confer with him.
