CHASED HALF **ROUND WORLD**

Montreal Bank Thief Arrested After Nine Years.

tole \$20 000 From the City District Bank of Montreal, Where he was Engaged as Bookkeeper.

New York, July 11 .- After eluding the police of Montreal for nine years formerly a bank clerk, was arrested Detective-Sergeant Roche, of Brooklyn, in Manhattan, this afternoon, charged with stealing \$2,000 from the City District Bank of Mont-

Levesque is now 34 years old. He has influential relatives in Montreal. has influential relatives in Montreal. In 1887, they got him a place in the City District Bank as messenger. Two years later he was made a bookkeeper. On December 1, 1891, he and another employe disappeared, and the bank examiners discovered that there was a shortage of nearly \$20,000.

Levesque was followed by detectives to Buenos Ayres and other places in South America, but they did not catch him. Then they heard that he was

him. Then they heard that he was in Santa Fe, New Mexico, and hastened there only to learn that they were several days too late.

A few days ago, Capt. Reynolds, of the Detective Bureau in Brooklyn, was told by a friend that a man named Levesque, who formerly lived in Canada, was living in a furnished room at 4 Middaugh street. When Capt. Renolds was positive that he had found the thief he wired to Montreal, and Chief Carpenter and one of his captains, arrived in Brooklyn today with requisition papers. Detective-Sergeant Roche took the Montreal officers to a large restaurant in Manhattan, where Levesque was employed as a waiter. Chief Carpenter recognized him at once, although he has aged considerably. Levesque was arrested and taken to Brooklyn.

ADMITTED STEALING \$20,000. Levesque acknowledged that he and his companion had stolen nearly \$20,-000 from the bank. He said that he had believed the police had forgotten all about it. He said he kept track of his companion for five years, and then lost trace of him. The stolen money was divided between them, and Levesque spent his share years ago travelling around the country. He said he would go back to Montreal.

Levesque will be arraigned before Judge Thomas in the United States Circuit Cour' to-morrow, and if he does not put in any objections Judge Thomas will sign the necessary papers and Levesque will be on the way to Montreal before evening.


