THE ESTIMATES BROUGHT DOWN

Continued from First Page. 018, as compared with \$129,160 last year. The London Normal School gets \$3,350 — \$1,800 for building and grounds; \$300 for domestic science; \$300 for grounds and gardens; \$750 for cementing floors, and \$500 for furnishings.

There are revotes of \$10,000 for the site of the reformatory in Oxford county, and \$20,000 for the building.

THE BUDGET FOR-MORROW. The Premier intimated that the motion to go into supply would be the first order on Wednesday.

Mr. Matheson remarked that it was short notice. In the Dominion House the public accounts had been down over a month. "The only disadvantage is personally to myself," he said, "and those who have to speak. They have to sit down for three nights while the minister, with a staff of clerks behind him, is in a position to prepare himself in advance. There should be at least three or four days between the receipt of the estimates and public accounts and the budget speech."

"Things will be brief and clear," said the Premier, jocularly.

THE ASSESSMENT BILL. Mr. Whitney asked if the Premier could inform the House as to the bringing down of the assessment bill. It was commonly rumored that the bill had been reported by the assessment commission. If so, the senior members of the Legislature should have the opportunity of looking it over.

The Premier replied that no bill had been reported by the commission. He expected that this week or early next week the report of the assessment commission would be laid on the table. There would be no bill from the commission as to any particular phase of assessment, but a government bill in the question of assessment would be down within a reasonable time.

Mr. Whitney—Perhaps the commission were discouraged by their previous draft of an assessment bill and the fate it met, and do not see their way clear to do it again.—Laughter.

PROHIBITION. Dr. Barr asked when the prohibition bill would be down, but the Premier only smiled.

Architect Carswell Celebrates the Completion of his Separate School Contract.

A very pleasant event took place at Hall's cafe last night, being a supper given by Jas. Carswell, architect, to commemorate the completion of the Separate school, which was designed and built under his able superintendence.

WON'T SEPARATE

Holy Trinity and St. Thomas Churches Satisfied With Present Arrangement.

On the application of the rural deanery of Kent, and some private individuals, the majority of the executive of the Synod decided to separate Holy Trinity church and St. Thomas church, Dover, and to connect the latter with a church to be established at Mitchell's Bay.

This would deprive the rector of Holy Trinity church of the endowment of about \$400 received annually from St. Thomas church, and would deprive the congregation of St. Thomas church of the services of the rector of Holy Trinity church, owing to the representations made to the Synod, it was doubtful whether this re-arrangement would be acceptable to the churches concerned, and a congregational meeting called by the church wardens was called in the Dover church last Monday, and the congregation invited Rural Dean McCosh, and Mr. Wilson, K. C., to attend, which they did, and explained their respective views on the subject.

Mr. McCosh, in the Synod, had supported the separation of Trinity and St. Thomas churches, while Mr. Wilson had opposed the separation at present.

The congregation decided to oppose separation from Holy Trinity church by a vote of 42 against six.

Mr. William Stephenson, Sunday School superintendent, was appointed, unanimously, by the congregation to go the next meeting of the executive of the Synod in London, and oppose separation. Holy Trinity church is also taking the matter up and will hold a congregational meeting to discuss the matter in the near future.

Rev. T. Beverly Smith seems to have aroused the enthusiasm of both congregations in church work.
