he Secretary of War Makes Some Unpleasant Explanations Regarding the Matter

London, March 12 .- In the House of Commons yesterday, Charles McKinnon Douglas, Liberal, moved for an inquiry regarding the retirement of Major-General Colville, who was sent home from South Africa by Lord Roberts for inefficiency in the field. Mr. Brodrick, Secretary of War, replied that the motion compelled him to say things he would probably leave unsaid, but that he would tell the House the whole truth. After declaring that he had nothing to apologize for in the course the War Office had taken, he proceeded to criticise severely General Colville's conduct. "At Sanna's Post," said the Secretary of War, "General Colville blundered about and manoeuvred about until his force was weary, while the Boers car-ried off guns unmolested. Lord Rob-erts thought Col. Broadwood did right, although Gen. Colville took ex-ception to Col. Broadwood's behavior. Gen. Colville left Col. Broadwood and his shattered force severely alone, and marched his troops in another direc-tion. He showed a lack of enterprise which lost him the confidence of Lord Roberts. Lord Roberts, however, postponed his decision until he should be fully informed. Then came the unfortunate Lindley surrender, for which General Colville was blameable, as he ought to have attempted to effect relief. I consulted Lord Roberts regarding the Gibraltar com-mand, and I had no alternative after the advice from Lord Roberts and Sir Evelyn Wood. I gave Gen. Colville an opportunity to resign, but he insisted on being removed. I consider Gen. Colville has been treated more leniently than if he had been court-mar-tialled. Every possible pressure has been brought to bear in his favor, but
