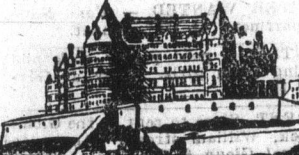

VOTES FOR INDIANS.

Deputation of Red Men Wait on Premier Whitney.

Toronto, April 13.—Chief J. H. Fisher, M. P. P. for North Brant, yesterday introduced Chief Hill and two warriors from the Mohawk Reserve, accompanied by a young Indian from the university, to Premier Whitney and Hon. J. J. Foy. They asked that the franchise be extended to Indians, and presented a petition signed very largely by members of the Dominion Government. It stated that there were 4,700 Indians in Ontario with a voting strength of 1,100. Premier Whitney promised consideration.

The Indians were disfranchised by the Dominion Government on the ground that they were wards of the Dominion. They asked to be given the privilege of voting in Ontario, and many Dominion members would like to see this.

The Milan astronomer, Signor Pini, states that two comets were discovered in November last, but their actual orbits had not yet been ascertained. Neither of them was, however, likely to approach the earth.

ABOUT THE HOUSE.

A Box In Which Boots Can Be Kept.

HOW IT IS TO BE MADE.

Exact Measurements Are Given, Which if Followed Carefully Will Bring About Very Satisfactory Results For the Amateur Carpenter.

"What shall we do with our boots?" occasionally becomes a question of almost tragic importance in a large family, and even the owners of bachelor

establishments, be they male or female, sometimes find their footwear too much with them.

Here is a suggestion for the making of a box in which boots can conveniently be kept and in which they will be preserved far better than in the dark, nearly inaccessible cupboard bottom, which is their usual resting place.

Suppose that six pairs of boots have to be provided for. Then the inside measurement of the back of the box should be twenty-seven inches by twenty-seven inches, and it should be about nine inches deep.

Besides the box itself you will require fifty-four inches of wooden rod three-fourths of an inch square, twenty-four thin wire nails one inch long and a few one inch screws.

The square wooden rod should be in twenty-seven inch lengths to fit the back of the box.

One corner of the whole length of this rod must be slightly rounded, so that its section is like that shown in Fig. 1.

When this has been done, the rod must be measured off into four and

DRAWING SHOWS HOW THE NAILS ARE ARRANGED.

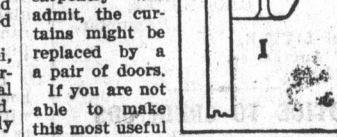
one-half lengths, leaving two and one-fourth inches at either end. Halve the four and one-half inch lengths with your pencil, and at a distance of one-half inch each side of these pencil marks drive a nail so that its sharp end protrudes a fourth of an inch from the top of the rod, as shown in Fig. 1.

When you have treated both your rods in this manner, they will each contain six pairs of nails and will look like Fig. 2. The rods must now be screwed on to the back of the box four and one-half inches from the top and the other ten and one-half inches from the bottom.

Now stand the box up and place the heels of the boots you wish to store over the nails. You will find that they hang quite securely and are easily put in position or removed.

A good finish is given if the box is painted inside and out with some serviceable color and curtain ringed to slide on a rod hung in front (Fig. 3) shows it thus completed. But if your skill at carpentry will admit, the curtains might be replaced by a pair of doors.

If you are not able to make this most useful article yourself, a carpenter would make one for a few dollars, and the outlay would soon be covered by the lengthened wear of the properly cared for boots.

To Save Starch. After using cold water starch, let what remains settle. Then pour off the water and allow the starch to dry. When dry, it can be replaced in the starch box for future use.

Be careful not to let it be a degree looser than is absolutely necessary for shaping itself and attempt it in none but the softest, thinnest material or the result will be that most unbecoming of all things, a thick neck.

Becoming Jewelry.

To insure beauty jewels must be worn with regard to color. Take, for instance, highly colored gems such as rubies and sapphires. They could not be worn with any shade of red. Soft colors should always be selected in such cases—turquoises, pearls or diamonds.

The woman with dull eyes must never wear diamond earrings, for these stones will make them appear duller. The pearl softens the face more than any other jewel.

Another stone which is equally becoming is the opal. A stone called tonkinoise, which is a pure blue, makes a sallow skin many shades lighter.

MAN NOT BORN TO READ.

That is the Reason He is Compelled to Wear Glasses.

Many of the commonest physical defects of civilized man are due to an imperfect adaptation of his body to new conditions of life. Nearsightedness is an example.

C. W. Saleeby, the English writer on scientific subjects, says that all the talk about the degeneration of the human eye is "undiluted nonsense." The truth is that "man was not born to read." An instrument made for seeing long distances is forced to accommodate itself to little marks and signs on a piece of paper. Says Dr. Saleeby, "The eye which we have inherited from our ancestors is one that is used without effort at long range, merely containing within it an apparatus enabling it at the cost of nervous and muscular effort to be used at short range."

The general need of glasses arises from the necessity in modern life of the use of the eyes at short distances. If the eye were naturally focused upon near objects the advantage, as Dr. Saleeby admits, would be great. However, he continues, "If one started to make a list of the bodily characters of man which the amazing development of his intelligence has rendered more or less appropriate to his needs, the originally one would require a volume."

GAY FUNERAL RITES.

Curious Ceremonies That Accompany Cremation in Siam.

The funerals of young unmarried la-

dies in Siam are grotesquely gay, so to speak. The color of the coffin is bright scarlet, and bright scarlet, too, are the hearse, the liveries of the driver, the harness and the plumes that nod on the heads of the horses.

But for a gay funeral we must go to the cremation of the dead in Siam. When the body is that of a prince the proceedings are most elaborate. Gold carriages gallop about, and the pyre is ultimately lighted by the king himself with candles which have been lighted at the sacred lamps in the temples of his palace, which burn night and day. The lighting of the funeral pyre is followed up with sports and the lotus dance. The king promotes the mirth by tossing limes to the people, by whom they are eagerly fought for, as inserted in each are current coins of the realm. Darkness, having at length fallen over the land, fireworks and gay illuminations conclude these curious funeral rites.
