MILK SHERBET.

A Delicious and Inexpensive Dessert For Any Season.

In our house milk sherbet is the most popular dessert on the hottest day of summer or the coldest day of winter. To make it you take one quart of rich milk, three lemons, three-fourths of a pint of granulated sugar and one ta-blespoonful of granulated white gela-

Put the gelatin to soak in half a cupful of the cold milk, putting the remainder of the milk to boil in a farina boiler with half the sugar. Stir When it boils add the soaked well. gelatin, remove from the fire and stir until all is thoroughly dissolved. Strain into the ice cream can; put away to cool. While it cools prepare the flavoring thus: Wash the lemons well, dry them, grate the rind of one and squeeze the juice of three in a dish, add the remaining half of the sugar, stir and mix thoroughly; stand

in a cool place until needed. Pack the tub in which the freezer is placed in the regular way with very finely broken ice and coarse salt. Pour the lemon and sugar into the prepared milk. Cover and freeze in the or dinary way, which will take from fifdinary way, which will take troin in-teen to twenty minutes. Remove the dasher, pack away and give at least one hour to ripen before using. If these directions are followed exactly the result will be most satisfactory, producing a delicious and inexpensive ssert for five or six persons.—Table
