Owing to the drought and consequent shortage in the water supply of New York city the strictest measures have been taken to prevent a water famine. All saloon keepers have been notified to discontinue to use water machines which run their beer pumps. The use of the croton water is not allowed for any of the following purposes, under penalty of having the supply immediately shut off: For baths in club and public houses, for washing vehicles with hose in livery stables, washing street cars, or wetting brick or other building material by means of hose. Rain-making experiments have been tried over the region of the Croton Lake dam with some success, but several inches of rain are needed to prevent the supply giving out.

PROPOSED FRUIT EXHIBITION.—London will next year have an exhibition promoted by the Fruiters' Company, consisting of a show of fruit from the principal countries serving the English market. Canada, Tasmania, New Zealand, and Australia will be invited to exhibit, and the Cape of Good Hope may send something. Of course The Royal Horticultural Society, the Royal Agricultural Society, the Royal Botanical Society, and the British Fruitgrowers' Association, have all promised to assist.

CLYDE FOREIGN SHIPPING TRADE.—The shipping trade of the Clyde during the month of October has been very quiet. Arrivals numbered 118 vessels of 126,124 tons, being a falling off to the extent of 10,832 tons. This decrease is chiefly in timber imports and general cargo by steamers from the State ports. Sailings for the month numbered 148 vessels of 171,472 tons, being a decrease of 18,236 tons as contrasted with the dispatch for October last year.
