#### Agricultural Society Meeting.

The first quarterly meeting of Union Agricultural Society of Cornwallis, was held at the hall, Church St., on Tuesday, the 5th. It proved to be one of the best meetings held for some time. The hall was packed with the representative fruit growers and farmers. After the routine business there were papers and speeches by leading fruit growers and by Prof. Sears, of the School of Horticulture. Prof. Sears gave a very valuable and instructive paper on Management of Soil in the Orchard. This was followed by a practical paper on Spraying, by C. A. Patriquin. Mr Ralph Eaton spoke on Spraying, giving many valuable points to those proposing to spray. Mr John Starr, who has been looking after the interests of the fruit growers in England, gave a very interesting and practical speech on the value of shipping good fruit. He spoke very emphatically on the importance of spraying to rid the apple of the black spot which depreciates the value of our apples on the market very much. A very lively and practical discussion followed on spraying. Prof. Sears giving much information on the subject.

Messrs Illeley & Harvey exhibited an Eclipse Spray Pump, which has been known to do good work.
