## Local News.

MODERATE winds, generally clear weather, fine weather to-morrow, and warmer than to-day, are the probs. received this morning.

SCOTT ACT.--At a meeting of delegates from all the temperance organizations in Waterloo county held in Galt last week, it was finally decided to submit the Scott Act to the electors.

FESTIVAL.--On Thursday evening a very interesting fruit festival was given in Zion Congregational Church. There was a very good attendance, the refreshments were delicious and the programme prepared was of interest throughout.

NEW MINISTERS.--Rev. W. Williams and Rev. W. J. Maxwell, arrived in Guelph on Friday, and were welcomed at the station by members of the congregations over which they will preside. On Sunday Mr. Maxwell will preach morning and evening in the Dublin street church, and Mr. Williams in the Norfolk street church.

CRUELTY TO A HORSE.--The Dundas Banner says:--Mr. Jonathan Booth, of Caledonia, was the man who drove his horse to death on the Hamilton Road. The horse was Abdullah Chief, a very valuable animal, worth about \$1,500. Booth was heavily drunk, and drove his horse under the lash all the way from Ancaster until he dropped into the ditch near Banbury's from sheer exhaustion. Even then Booth behaved like a madman, kicking and beating the poor dumb brute in a terribly cruel manner. He also attacked several parties who were assisting to get the horse out of the ditch, but met his match and got his eyes blackened by the Guelph stage driver, who showed considerable pluck in punishing the bully for his outrageous conduct. Booth was arrested and fined \$10 for cruelty to animals, and was also fined for furious driving and for using profane language. He ought to have been sent to prison for six months.

TO-DAY'S MARKET.--The vegetable market to-day was pretty well attended. Fruit and vegetables are a trifle cheaper than last week. Strawberries were sold at 4 boxes for 25c, or \$2.75 per crate, in one case \$2.50 was asked; cooking cherries were offered at the same; eating cherries 10c per quart was asked, and only a few in the market; in a few days there will be an abundance, and cherries may be bought in larger quantities much cheaper; for green gooseberries 8c, per box was asked. In vegetables the supply was abundant--peas shelled 10c, a quart, 20c, a peck undressed; fine new potatoes were offered at 15c, per half-gallon measure; radishes, onions, and carrots, 5c, per bunch; lettuce, 3 bunches for 12c; rhubarb, 3 bunches for 12c, 4c, a bunch singly, in one case a dozen bunches could be had for 25c; beans 5c, a bunch; beans, very small, were offered at two or three prices. Celery plants 30c, per box; cabbage plants from 10c, to 12c, per hundred. Chickens sold 25c, per pair; butter 11c., eggs from 10c.

ST. GEORGE'S SOCIETY.--A regular monthly meeting of the members of this Society was held in their hall last night. There was a large attendance, and much interest was manifested in the business of the evening. Mr. G. Elliott, President, occupied the chair. Mr. James Hewer, as secretary of the late excursion committee, presented and read a full statement of the receipts and expenditure, which resulted in his being able to hand over the sum of \$166.46, as net profits, which sum will be divided between St. George's Society and the Wellington Artillery Brigade Band. The result was considered very satisfactory. Some fault was found with the railway company for not supplying keys for the cars. If this had been done a much larger sum might have been realized. Moved by Mr. Brill, seconded by Capt. Swinford, that the thanks of the Society be tendered to the following gentlemen, the committee, Messrs. Jas. Hewer, Charles Maddock, W. Reid, J. Reid, A. H. Goodlove, and Wm. Burgess, who managed the excursion to Toronto, for the very able manner in which the arrangements were managed, and for the addition to the funds through the exertion of the committee. Several members of the committee replied on behalf of the vote of thanks tendered to them. Moved by Mr. Hewer, seconded by Mr. Jenkins, that the report of the special committee on the excursion to Toronto, be received and adopted, and that half of the net proceeds be paid to Major Macdonald, on account of the Wellington Field Battery Band. An oversight at the last monthly meeting occurred, with reference to a vote of thanks to a reverend gentleman of the city, whereupon it was moved by Mr. A. H. Goodlove, seconded by Mr. W. Reid, that a cordial vote of thanks from the Society be tendered to the Rev. W. Manchee, for the very able and instructive sermon preached by him on the occasion of the anniversary. Two or three members spoke in complimentary terms of the excellent discourse given by the rev. gentleman. Throughout the meeting compliments of a very praiseworthy character were bestowed on the gentlemen who conducted the late excursion, and more especially to Mr. James Hewer, for doing the lion's share of the work.

Fare by Grand Trunk, return tickets good till Monday, has been placed at the low figure of \$1.

DISMISSED.--The young lad Samuel Platt, charged with stealing a pair of shoes from a wagon in the Victoria Hotel sheds, was brought before Mayor Howard on Friday afternoon. No evidence was offered for the prosecution, and the prisoner was discharged, after His Worship had given him some wholesome advice.

Tax Dundas Banner says:--Two carriage loads of Dundas Caledonians visited Guelph on Dominion Day, five of them being in Highland costume, with Piper Gordon, of Hamilton, accompanying them. They received a hearty welcome and are loud in their praises of the hospitality of Guelph Scotchmen.

SONG SERVICE.--The Y. M. C. A. Sabbath evening meetings will be held during the summer months in the tent, commencing to-morrow evening at 8.15 p. m., when a song service will be held. The Song Evangel and Mr. Moody's new hymn book will be used. A crowded tent is expected.

THE GOSPEL TEMPERANCE CLUB.--It is a pleasure to notice that the Temperance tent has again been erected for the summer on the lot next to the Methodist church on Dublin street, and the Rev. Wm. From the well known ability of these gentlemen and the assistance that will be given by others, a very interesting time may be expected. LICENSE COMMISSIONERS.--A meeting of the Commissioners for South Wellington, was held at Tyrconnell, the residence of Judge Macdonald, on Thursday evening. There were present the Judge, in the chair, Messrs. Jas. Goldie, Wm. Stevenson and Inspector Goodfellow. After routine business was transacted, the Inspector informed the Commissioners that application would be made by a gentleman from Toronto, for a license to open a saloon on Wyndham or Quebec street. In reference to the matter, the following resolution was carried, which will inform the public that no saloon licenses will be granted: Moved by Messrs. Goldie and Stevenson, that the Commissioners cannot hold out inducements to any person to fit up premises for a tavern, with limited accommodation, in the nature of a saloon, in the hopes that a license can be obtained for such premises. With respect to a tavern license, the Commissioners cannot act without report of Inspector according to law.

LACROSSE.--A closely contested and really interesting game of lacrosse was played in the Agricultural Park on Friday afternoon between the Berlin and Guelph junior lacrosse clubs. The little fellows on both sides astonished the spectators by their fine playing. The first and only game lasted two hours and five minutes. The only delay during the game was caused by one of the visitors being hit by the ball. As he was laid up, the Guelph team dropped a man, and the game continued with eleven on a side. It had been agreed to stop playing at 6.30 o'clock. At 6.05 R. Flaws threw the ball through the Berlin goal, and the game was scored for Guelph. Berlin decided that it would be almost useless to commence another game at that late hour. A return match will be played in a couple of weeks. GALT.--Mr. George Landreth, after a two years' absence in Australia, has returned to Galt. A slide of earth in "Barrie's cut," on the Credit Valley railway, near this town, on Friday morning last, caught a laborer named Michael Carroll before he could get out of the way, and broke his leg.--Mr. Wm. Robinson and Dr. Ferguson have left on a trip to Manitoba.

DAMAGED BY A STORM.--On Thursday evening a very heavy thunder storm and hurricane passed over the north east of Paris, doing considerable damage to property and crops. Three barns belonging to Joseph Hill were blown down. Loss about \$2,000. Several other barns were injured. One belonging to L. Sovereign was carried twelve feet without injury to the frame.

TOO DRUNK TO BE FOOLHARDY.--On the 4th of July there were a large number of excursions to Niagara Falls. The people were mostly drawn by the announcement that H. J. Peet was to repeat his jump from the Suspension Bridge into the Niagara River. He was announced to jump at two o'clock, long before the appointed hour the crowds had assembled on both banks of the river, and the new Suspension Bridge was loaded with a weight of human beings waiting to see the feat performed. After three hours' waiting Peet came on the bridge intoxicated. He made his preliminary arrangements, changed his clothing, but dared not make his leap, leaving the crowds to go home thoroughly disgusted.

The celebration of the 4th of July, was generally observed in the States. It was very quiet in many cities, owing to the fire-cracker nuisance being prohibited.

The village of Hanover has passed a By-law, granting a bonus of \$2,000 to the
