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The Song of Songs.

A scholarly article, by Ellice Hop-

kins, in the April CENTURY, dis-

cusses the Canticles from the point

of view now dominant in Biblical

criticism, a view different, in certain

particulars, from that given in Pro-

fessor W. Robertson Smith's article,

"Canticles," in the new edition of

the "Encyclopaedia Britannica."

The writer says in part:

Most of us, I suppose, have, from

time to time, perceived the Song of

Songs, which is Solomon's, as it

stands in the authorized version,

with a perplexed feeling as to what

it means. Perhaps, if we were

honest enough, we should confess

also to a feeling of violent discom-

fort and distaste. Should we have

turned in our perplexity to an ortho-

dox commentator, these feelings

would scarcely have been relieved by

fading language of a confessedly

eccentric character and of doubtful

propriety—some of it addressed by

a voluptuous king to an inmate of

his harem—transferred entire to the

mouth of Christ as his language in

addressing his Church.

It has, however, been received for

modern Hebrewists to restore this

lovely little epithalamium to its pro-

per place, and scraping away the ac-

cumulated whitewash and plaster of

ages—the mistranslations and misun-

derstandings of centuries—to reveal

as it is, an exquisite little drama of

the affections, embedded in the very

heart of our Bible, afresh with pas-

sionate and pure and chaste and en-

doring as sculptured marble. * * *
