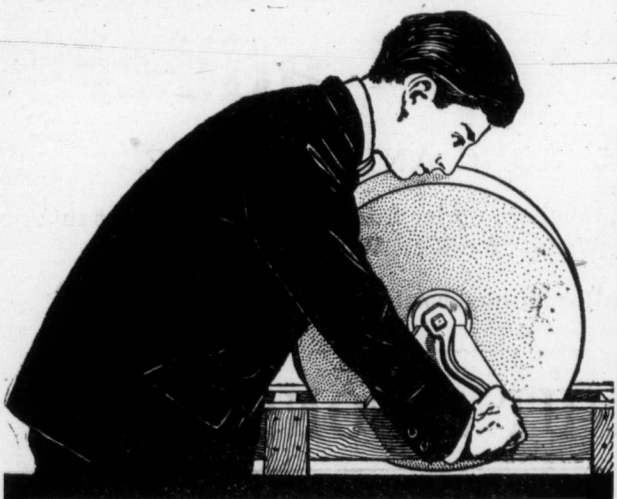

### A RECORD RUN.

Michigan Central Railway Carries a Train at the Rate of 78 Miles an Hour.

St. THOMAS, Ont., April 28.—The Michigan Central Railway yesterday made a world's record for fast runs on steam railways. President Ledyard of the Michigan Central and President Newman of the N. Y. Central passed over the Michigan Central enroute from New York to Chicago on a special train of one baggage and three private cars. From Niagara Falls to St. Thomas, 117 miles, the train was in 111 minutes, or 111 miles, was made in 94 minutes and 30 seconds; from Shelden to Essex, 84 miles, the run was made in 66 minutes, or 78 1/3-100 miles an hour.


