**Banquet Given in His Honor by the**  
**Geographical Society.**

PARIS, Jan. 21, 1878.

The following detailed report of the interesting entertainment given to Mr. Henry M. Stanley by the Paris Geographical Society is compiled from the Paris journals. Mr. Stanley's speech is given verbatim as spoken.

On Saturday, the 19th inst., the banquet given in honor of Henry M. Stanley by the Paris Geographical Society of Paris took place at the Hotel du Louvre, Paris. The reunion was presided over by Admiral La Ronciere

Noury, having on his right M. Lamorelle who represented the Marshal-President; Baron de Watteville and others; and on his left United States Ministers, Noyes, Commandant Moncheur, Mr. Campbell Clarke, of the Daily Telegraph; M. J. J. Ryan, Admiral Fleuriot de Laugie, M. Jansen, M. Malte Brun and other distinguished gentlemen. There were 240 covers and the banquet was of the most elegant description.

**SPEECH OF ADMIRAL LA RONCIERE LE NOURY.**

After the admirably served dinner had been disposed of Admiral La Ronciere le Noury drew attention to the splendid achievements of the guest of the evening in the following speech:—

GENTLEMEN.—The history of geography is essentially a history of discovery. It is the history of the human mind struggling with the forces and the secrets of nature. Man thus appears to us the greater by the power which he derives from the nobility of his faculties, from his highest qualities; and among the heroes of this epic, the explorers are the most extraordinary vicissitudes, and we see before us to-night one of the most striking examples. About two hundred years ago some French explorers made known to the world the principal geographical lines of those immense territories which the American Union now day by day occupies to the eastward of the Atlantic. Champlain, Cavelier de la Salle and Marquet were representatives of that constellation of explorers whose memory we cannot forget for the honor of our country, too often recalled. To-day it is a child of those United States—

—who has come to solve the last of the great geographical problems. The solution of the legendary question of the sources of the Nile is presented to us to-night by a man who has not only solved it, but who has also discovered the vast blank space which covered the centre of our globe of Africa has furnished with the bed of a stream which can compare with the majestic rivers hitherto known.
